Troy University students
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TROY worldwide enrollment tops 27,000

Troy University is reporting record enrollment numbers for the third straight year, as the University now serves more than 27,000 students worldwide, according to the Office of Institutional Research.

The official headcount enrollment figure for fall semester is 27,117, a 16 percent increase over the 23,341 headcount reported for fall 2003.

The enrollment total is composed of data from four campuses in Alabama, in Troy, Dothan, Montgomery and Phenix City, as well as University College, which operates more than 60 campuses outside of Alabama in 17 U.S. states and 11 nations. The University College Division receives no Alabama taxpayer funding.

“This is encouraging news and

reflects the hard work and dedication of hundreds of people throughout Troy University, such as the members of our faculty and our staff, who are committed to providing excellent service to students and a top-quality academic environment,” Dr. Jack Hawkins, Jr., chancellor, said. “We have set a goal to enroll 30,000 students worldwide by fall 2008. It

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Five of a kind

National Guard unit in Iraq includes five TROY alumni

Five members of the Alabama National Guard's 2101st Transportation Company share more in common than their unit's dangerous missions delivering fuel throughout the Iraqi countryside.

In addition to their duties in Iraq, Capt. Chris Amos, Sgt. John Hargray, 1st Sgt. Carl McNeece, 2nd Lt. Eric Pouncy and Sgt. Sol Tepper all are alumni of Troy University. Tepper graduated in 1989, McNeece in 1994, Amos in 1995, and Pouncy in 1999. Hargray is scheduled to graduate in 2005.

The Trojan quintet has been deployed in Iraq since Aug. 2 and has been a part of the unit's 64 missions covering a total of more than 300,000 miles and distributing more than 3.1 million gallons of fuel.

"We have been extremely fortunate in sustaining no casualties through four attacks on our convoys so far, and I hope that trend continues," Capt. Amos said in a recent e-mail. "Strong arms have been around us because we have been through almost every hotspot currently being patrolled."

Troy University has a long-standing

Troy University to offer certification program in court administration

Troy University will offer a Certification Program in court administration beginning in January, according to Dr. Robert Pullen, dean of the Troy University College of Arts and Sciences.

The program will be offered through the Center for Continuing Education, Dr. Pullen said. He added that the goal of the Program is training and certification in the skills needed by modern court administrators.

"Court Administration is an emerging profession that offers rewarding career opportunities for students and for others in the community," Dr. Pullen said. "This weekend program offers specialized

training in the structure of the courts, finance and budgeting, technology, case management, human resources, jury management and intergovernmental relations. Professionally trained court administrators will be in great demand over the next decade."

Dr. Pullen said Allen Tapley, former administrative director of courts for the State of Alabama, is working with Troy University to develop the Program and curriculum. Tapley, along with judges, attorneys, district attorneys, and court administrators will teach the continuing education Program.

"Allen Tapley has been a leader in judicial administration and court

reform for more than 25 years," said Dr. Ed Stevens, who coordinates the program through the Troy University Department of Criminal Justice and Social Sciences. "During his tenure at the Administrative Office of Courts, the State of Alabama developed a unified court system that other states have used as a model for court management."

The Program will be offered on weekends, Saturdays and Sundays, beginning Jan. 8 on the Troy Campus. The program will continue through the weekend of March 12.

Dr. Flynt, a professor at Auburn University and acclaimed author, will speak on the topic *Separation of Church and State: The Unfolding Dilemma*. Flynt has written 11 books, including the

Pulitzer-Prize nominated *Poor but Proud: Alabama's Poor Whites*.

Dr. Flynt's most recent book, *Alabama in the Twentieth Century*, was honored with the 2004 Anne B. and James B. McMillan Prize.

Herbert Reeves, dean of student services, said this latest deployment brings the number of students who have left the Troy campus this semester because their National Guard or Reserve units have been deployed to about 20. He explained that when students are forced to leave school to fulfill a military obligation, they are given a full refund for the semester.

"We try to be as helpful with the students who are deployed as we can," Reeves said.

But not all of the Troy University students who have been activated are enrolled on the Troy Campus, as students at the Dothan, Montgomery and Phenix City campuses have been called to duty as well.

In addition, many of the students in the University College division, which operates all of Troy University's teaching sites outside Alabama, are active military personnel and have been deployed to the Middle East.

appears we are well on our way of achieving this goal."

The TROY chancellor said part of the reason for the enrollment success is that Troy University serves both traditional-age and adult students with a variety of delivery methods, including distance learning.

Dr. Hawkins added that internationalization efforts also played a key role in increasing enrollment.

He pointed out that enrollment of international students on the main campus in Troy is up 12 percent over 2003.

Sustained enrollment growth is vital for Troy University because of dwindling support from state appropriations, Chancellor Hawkins said.

"Only approximately 23 percent of our budget comes from state appropriations," Dr. Hawkins said. "We depend on tuition as our primary source of budget revenue."

High honor

Troy University salutes three alumni, one honorary alumnus

Troy University honored three graduates and one special friend on Saturday, Nov. 6, during the Homecoming game against Florida Atlantic University.

The Distinguished Alumni of the Year awards and Honorary Alumnus of the Year were presented during half-time by Dr. Jack Hawkins, Jr., chancellor, and Sammy Carr, president of the National Alumni Association Board of Directors.

The recipients are Dr. Leon G. Davis of Montevallo, Amy Smith Parrish of Destin, FL, and Harrel McKinney of Montgomery. Joe Thomas Malugen of Dothan is this year's recipient of the Honorary Alumnus of the Year award, which is given annually to a non-alumnus supporter of the University.

Award recipients are chosen annually by a vote of the National Alumni Association board, which solicits nominations from TROY alumni and the general public.

Dr. Leon G. Davis of Montevallo, retired from the University of Montevallo in 1991 after 28 years of teaching and service to the athletic department. He helped to establish the basketball program at Montevallo, then known as Alabama College, in 1963 and served as the team's head coach through its first five seasons before resigning the position to become director of athletics. During his tenure, Davis also served as coach of the Montevallo tennis and golf teams and taught in the

Department of Health, Physical Education and Recreation. Davis served on several National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics boards and committees and was the association's national president in 1982-83. In 1984, he was inducted into the NAIA Hall of Fame for Meritorious Service. Davis

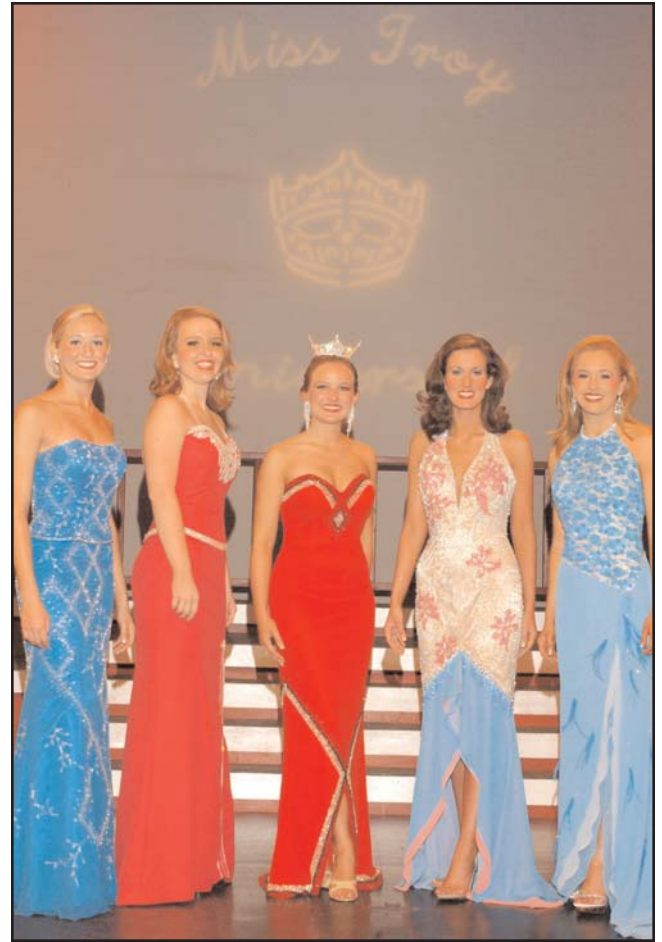

Dothan Campus to participate in Alabama Aerospace Celebration

The Troy University, Dothan Campus College of Education's Wiregrass Math and Science Consortium, Alabama Education Association and Alabama Aerospace Cadre will sponsor the 2004 Alabama Aerospace Lift-Off Celebration on Nov. 18-19.

The theme for this year's event is entitled, "Learning from the Past—Looking to the Future." Additional sponsors include the City of Ozark, Alabama Civil Air Patrol, NASA, Tallahassee Challenger Center for Space Science Education, U.S. Space Camp, Fort Rucker's Army Aviation Technical Center (AATC) and the U.S. Army Aviation Museum and local area school systems.

During the lift-off ceremony scheduled for Thursday, Nov. 18 from 9:30 a.m. – 11 a.m. at the Ozark Civic
