New appointment

Alumnus named to TROY’s Board of Trustees

Alabama Gov. Bob Riley has appointed Mobile attorney and TROY alumnus Forrest S. Latta to the University’s Board of Trustees.

“I’m glad to have someone of Forrest’s caliber representing the First District on our board,” said Dr. Doug Hawkins, president pro-tem of the University’s board of trustees. “I knew him as a student and he was very outstanding then and has since made a name for himself. He has been very active in our alumni association as well as in state affairs. He’s very knowledgeable and I welcome him to the board.”

Latta, a member of Bowron, Latta & Wasden, P.C. law firm, practices primarily in the areas of insurance litigation, product liability litigation, business litigation and appellate litigation. He graduated summa cum laude from Troy University in 1980 and completed his juris doctorate at Samford University’s Cumberland Law School in 1983. While at Cumberland, he was a member of the Cumberland Law Review, the National Trial Team and Curia Honoris Senior Honorary.

“Coming back to TROY, I was most impressed,” Latta said. “While the University has the same heart, soul and spirit it had when I was a student, the University has ‘grown up’ a lot in the years I’ve been away. It’s now truly an international and world-wide university – one of the first

Diploma time

Alabama National Guard's adjutant general to speak at commencement

Major General Mark Bowen, adjutant general of the Alabama National Guard, will provide the commencement address at Troy University Dec. 9.

Commencement will begin at 10:30 a.m. in Sartain Hall. About 350 students are expected to receive diplomas during the ceremonies.

Bowen was appointed to the Guard's top post in 2003 by Gov. Bob Riley, after having served for 44 years. He joined the Alabama Guard at age 16 and spent six years as an

enlisted man before being commissioned when he completed the Alabama Military Academy in April 1962. His early assignments were in transportation,

engineer and infantry units. During his career, he served as commander of an engineer company, transportation battalion, mechanized infantry battalion and ordnance group, as well as a number of key staff positions.

In 1989, he was promoted to brigadier general and assigned as Deputy Commanding General, 167th Support Command in Birmingham. In June 1991, he was assigned to the 31st Separate Armored Brigade in Northport as commander. Four years later, he was promoted to major general and assigned as Commander, 62nd Troop Command in Montgomery, where he served until August 1997. His last assignment before his initial retirement was as Commanding General of the 167th Logistical Support Command in Birmingham until his retirement in June 2000. He returned to the Alabama Guard in January 2003 in his present assignment as Adjutant General.

In civilian life, Bowen is an Auburn pharmacy graduate and has owned and operated two pharmacies prior to his retirement. Married to the former Sandra Evans, Bowen continues to operate a farm near Lineville.

in the nation and Alabama to see the possibilities of growth and reach its goals.”

“To be a part of the advancement of peoples’ lives – people who what to get ahead, who are working hard but still want a quality education through technology like eCampus is a tremendous opportunity,” he said.

Latta, a former broadcast journalist and Associated Press award winner for news coverage, is a member of the Alabama Supreme Court Standing Committee on Rules of Appellate Procedure, the Defense Research Institute, the Federation of Defense and Corporate Counsel and serves on the board of directors of the American Law Firm Association. He was a member of the Alabama Defense Lawyers Association board of directors from 1996-1998 and is a member of the American Bar Association and the Alabama State Bar.

“The appointment as trustee by Governor Riley is very humbling – first because I have great respect

for him personally and want to do a good job, and secondly because there are only nine people who get to serve as trustees, each serving a 12-year term,” Latta said. “I think many people do not realize the role of a trustee is to be a steward on behalf of its owners -- the citizens and taxpayers of the state – for whom Troy University is a huge investment.”

Latta said his personal philosophy as a trustee also extended to making quality education available to all – a good fit with the University’s commitment to serving both traditional and non-tradition college students.

“When I was in college, there were a lot of people who never had a chance to get a college degree because they were working full time or had full-time family commitments – they just couldn’t fit college in,” Latta said. “TROY is addressing this and it’s the future of education and TROY is way out front.”

Latta’s appointment must be confirmed by the State Senate when it convenes in January.

year on the Dothan Campus, Aerospace Day is meant to ignite the imaginations of educators and their students, according to Wiregrass Math & Science Consortium Project Director Christina Johnson.

“The purpose of Aerospace Day is to generate excitement among teachers,” Johnson said. “We want them to take what they learn back to their classrooms

and motivate their students to take an interest in math, science and technology.”

Shepherd, who was the first commander of the International Space Station, took part in four missions and logged over 159 days in space. A recipient of the Congressional Medal of Honor for Space, Shepherd is featured in the IMAX movie “Space Station.”

Buckbee, founder of the U.S. Space Camp and author of *The Real Space Cowboys*, has been affiliated with the U.S. Space Program for more than four decades.

Session presenters will include Paul Johnson, NASA engineer and founder of the “Wright Attitudes” program;

Cynda Fickert, 2004 State Teacher of the Year; Dr. Charley Rodriguez, of Southern Illinois University; and Dr. Patti Fritchie, a founder of the Alabama Reading Initiative.

CNN Space Shuttle Analyst Randy Avera will also be on hand for Aerospace Day. Avera is the author of *Memories of Columbia* and *The Truth About Challenger*.

Dealing with devastation

Troy University's Dr. Kenyon Knapp counsels victims of Hurricanes Katrina, Rita

As scenes of destruction in the aftermath of Hurricanes Katrina and Rita dominated the national media, Troy University's Dr. Kenyon Knapp knew that much more than property would need to be repaired.

Knapp, an assistant professor of counseling and psychology, saw in those images people who would need emotional, as well as physical assistance. And, he knew that he could help.

Knapp received permission from his department chair Dr. Nancy Crumpton and his associate dean Dr. Len Kitchens to travel to Shreveport, LA, to provide disaster counseling.

"I am grateful to Troy University for supporting me in providing disaster counseling to the thousands of hurricane evacuees," Knapp said.

Knapp joined a group of 11 other disaster counselors in helping hurricane survivors work through the trauma. The group worked in 10 shelters in the Shreveport area before extending its reach to nearby Alexandria, LA.

"When we began our work here on Sept. 23, Hurricane Rita was just about to move into Texas and Louisiana, so we had not only the

thousands of Katrina evacuees but the Rita evacuees as well," Knapp said. "There were well over 10,000 evacuees in Shreveport alone, overwhelming almost every shelter. People who had run out of gas in huge traffic jams on the interstates came in after leaving their cars along various highways."

Knapp worked with one such family that experienced great hardship as they attempted to escape the onslaught of Hurricane Rita.

"They packed many belongings and many family members in a large vehicle and raced to get away from the looming storm," Knapp said, recalling the family's situation. "As they raced up the highway, they blew a tire, skidded off the road into a ditch and came to an abrupt halt as the car burst into flames. Fortunately all the family members made it out alive and were able to grab a few half-melted bags before the car was engulfed in flames."

The family, battered by the wind and rain, was forced to hike along a deserted stretch of highway before being picked up by the police and taken to the shelter. As if they had not been through enough already, the family was not immediately allowed

to enter the shelter because the mother could not produce a required form of identification. Her driver's license had not escaped the flames of the burning car.

"They watched the news of their town being wiped off the map, and then they met with me. Imagine that counseling session," Knapp said.

Knapp's counseling was not limited to evacuees, however. "I met with a nurse who had been evacuating people by helicopter from her hospital following Hurricane Katrina. The process was so difficult and slow that some of her patients died, even though she had done a tremendous job of trying to rescue them," he said. "We also met with a 21-year-old soldier who told us how he just finished a week of collecting dead bodies in New Orleans, while hearing about his now-destroyed house in Lake Charles, LA. He was a courageous young man, yet was totally overwhelmed."

Knapp called the experience "physically and emotionally draining," but says he would definitely do it again.

"I have made new friends, been able to help a number of folks and have a whole new appreciation for the things that matter most," he said.

Education students raise money for hurricane-damaged Mississippi schools

A grand prize raffle ticket worth \$500 in prizes will be drawn Friday by Troy University education students in an effort to raise money for three Mississippi school systems damaged by Hurricane Katrina.

The TROY chapters of the Association for Childhood Education International and Kappa Delta Pi, an education honor society, have been hosting the raffle to benefit school districts in Gulfport, Pascagoula and Poplarville.

The money earned in the raffle will be used to purchase supplies for the schools that were heavily damaged during the storm, said Heather Lunsford, ACEI president and KDPI vice president.

"Over 40 businesses from all over the Troy area have opened their hearts and donated more than \$1,000

worth of goods and services," she said.

In addition to the \$1 tickets, the students have also painted faces and held a bake sale to help meet the \$3,000 goal, said Danielle Butts, a senior elementary education major and an ACEI officer. Through Monday, the two groups had raised about \$1,200.

"We should raise another \$2,000 by the end of the week," she said. "We have more than 30 people selling tickets."

Fifty runner-ups will also win a prize and the University department that buys the most raffle tickets will be treated to homemade goodies made by education majors on campus.

"We became involved with helping these school districts because we got

online, found out their numbers and email addresses, and contacted them to see what they needed to help," said Lunsford.

Butts said after contacting school officials, the groups will send a cash donation earmarked for each school for teaching supplies and textbooks.

"The schools sent us a list of supplies that they needed – and there was a lot on those lists," she said. "It's really up to those schools' discretion what they spend the money on."

The drawing for the grand prize and the 50 runner-up prizes will take place at 12:30 p.m. Friday in the Amphitheatre, located between the Adams Center and Wallace Hall on the Troy campus. Raffle tickets will be sold and cash donations accepted from 11 a.m. until 1 p.m. Friday.
