





~80% of our Water Supply is from Corps Reservoirs and Related Rivers








Average Annual Rainfall in Metropolitan Atlanta is 50"





What you can do to save water:

Fix leaking toilets

Only run dishwashers in full loads

Fix dripping faucets

Turn off the water while brushing your teeth

Shorten your shower time by 2 minutes

Don't leave the water running while shaving

Compost or scrape instead of rinsing your dishes by hand before putting them in the dishwasher

Scrape food into the trash instead of using a garbage disposal

Replace washing machine with high efficiency EnergyStar model

Replace inefficient showerheads (those with a flow rate of greater than 2 gallons per minute) with high efficiency WaterSense labeled showerheads

Replace older, inefficient toilets (those with greater than 1.6 gallons per flush) with high efficiency WaterSense labeled toilets

#### What is a septic system?

A residential septic system is an on-aite tank and leaching field located on your property that is used for treating all the wastewater from your house, which includes drainage from your dishwasher, washing machine, tollets, showers and sinks, Dorly functioning or failing residential septic systems can be a source of water pollution; they can leak sewage that contains pathogens and nutrients, which are then carried by stormwater to rivers, lakes and streams. By following a few simple tips, you can maintain your septic system to maximize its efficiency, reduce problems and potential expenses and help to protect our waterways!

#### Not sure if you have a septic system?

Contact your county health department to check if you have one and verify its location on your property.
