defining a "sponsored program"

A sponsored program is a Troy University activity that receives funding or support from an outside organization. Sponsored programs consists of funded projects covering a range of activities including research, teaching, training and services.

The project may be supported by a number of different sponsors, such as federal agencies, state agencies, private foundations, corporate or industry, or non-profit organizations. Sponsored project activities may be identified as a grant, contract, sub-grant/subcontract/sub-award, cooperative agreement, memorandum of understanding, fellowship, grant-in-aid, etc.

The overall indicator that an activity is a sponsored project is that the sponsor provides support for a specific activity, and the activity delivers something back to the sponsor.





Competitive Partnerships


Competitive Partnerships are defined as partnerships (grants and/or contracts) that require applicants, through an open Request for Proposal (RFP), to submit applications or proposals to obtain funding. Not all submitted proposals are selected in a competitive process.

Partnerships initially secured through a competitive process, then renewed based on project performance, are also included as competitive funding. These projects are asterisked in Sponsored Program detail reports.

Service Partnerships

Service partnerships are relational partnerships in which the university provides a specific service at the request of the partner. These partnerships are not open to other service providers through an open Request for Proposal (RFP).

a partner is selected the partner deadline for accepting materials is established



- Writers must secure approval from the Chair/Dean to proceed
- If approved to move forward, writers must seek clearance from OSP prior to developing the proposal. (OSP coordinates partner submissions to ensure that multiple proposals are not submitted to a partner that will only consider one application.)

university policy for approval of partner proposals



When anyone at Troy University - administrators, faculty, staff, or students - prepares grant and contract proposals for external funding, they are acting on behalf of the University. For that reason, all such proposals must pass through a <u>review and submission process</u> established by TROY.

Dr. Jack Hawkins, Jr., Ph.D., Chancellor serves as the Authorized Organization Representative

(AOR) for Troy University. Dr. Hawkins is the only authorized official to enter Troy University into partnerships with external funding agencies. All proposals and all subsequent revisions, adjustments, and changes of any previously approved grant or contract must be approved by the Chancellor through the review process as described here: (https://www.troy.edu/aboutus/offices-departments/sponsored-programs/writing-great-proposals/administrative-reviewapproval.html)

the transmittal package

The <u>routing of the transmittal package prior to the</u> **submission of materials to the partner** provides for both the university and the grant writer/grant writing team a process to document "awareness" and "support" for the commitments required to secure the partnership.

It is the expectation that the supervisory line for each grant writer has reviewed the completeness of the partnership and package to ensure that all commitments have been disclosed.

Signature on the package affirms to the SVC and Chancellor that the university is positioned to fulfill the promise as presented in the partner proposal.







compensation/course load buyouts

Partner support of time spent on sponsored partnerships can be requested in either **a buyout of time** or **compensation for duties.** Approval of partner supported time requests must be preapproved by the supervisory line through the Chancellor **prior** to the submission of materials.

<u>Course Load Reduction</u>

Definition of Extra Compensation


When a full-time university employee receives compensation which exceeds the assigned base salary, and when that compensation is offered in exchange for the performance of duties not legitimately required within the scope of the primary contract, this additional payment is defined as extra compensation. Extra compensation begins when the payment received for any one month exceeds the faculty or staff member's monthly base salary.

Approval and Determination of Rate of Compensation

Extra compensation on externally sponsored projects may be permitted if it is in accordance with the sponsor's rules and regulations. The rate of extra compensation shall be determined by the sponsor guidance with approval by the appropriate Director/Chair, Dean, Senior Vice Chancellor and Chancellor.

Any requests for extra compensation should be thoroughly explained and documented on the Transmittal Form in accordance with university policy regarding proposal development review and approval.

Troy University Compliance

indirect cost

Indirect Costs, also known as Facilities and Administration Costs (F&A Costs), are defined as costs that have been incurred for common or joint objectives of TROY and the sponsored program, and which, therefore, cannot be identified specifically in reference to a particular project, such as building operations and maintenance, laboratory space, library service, utilities, and administrative services.

TROY Sponsored Program proposals are expected to charge the maximum allowable indirect cost rate.

The **allowable indirect cost** rate is **determined by the sponsor agency** and can be found in the application instructions.

If the partner allows indirect cost but does not have a designated rate, writers must charge a minimum of **14% of all direct costs**.

Waivers of allowable indirect cost can only be approved by the Senior Vice Chancellor.

- The award document is forwarded to Sponsored Programs.
- Sponsored Programs works with <u>Sponsored Program Accounting</u> to establish university partner accounts.
- Financial management of the partnership is provided by <u>Sponsored</u> <u>Program Accounting</u>.
- Media, event and other project support is provided by Sponsored Programs upon request.

other sponsored program services

- Create, maintain, and distribute OSP database and <u>reports</u>
- Strategic planning, Chancellor briefings, Dean briefings, faculty training
- Coordination, and in some instances, the maintenance and filing of assurances to ensure university eligibility for partner funding
- Establishment, in partnership with accounting, of all <u>partner accounts</u>
- Signatory oversight, in partnership with accounting, of all financial expenses on funded partnerships
- Shared responsibility with human resources for university policies and procedures connected with the hiring of sponsored program personnel
- Significant on site coordination of partner events (stewardship of partners)
- Shared responsibility with academics for faculty awards from the <u>Grant</u> <u>Writing Fund</u>
- Organic and changing responsibilities connected with changing partnerships




Sponsored Program Reports

- <u>Comparison of dollars pursued</u> (fy to fy)
 - The "dollars pursued" report is a snapshot of dollars pursued between two fixed dates (September 1– August 31) and may change daily.
 - The final comparative number of dollars pursued is not "final" until all partnerships have received partner notification (i.e. funded/not funded).
 - **Funded** partnerships (including multi-year partnerships) are recorded according to the budget period.
 - Not Funded partnerships are counted in the year that they are submitted
