Director's Notes

The 1980s were marked by an onslaught of intense challenges and cultural shifts— Reagan, counterculture, the war on drugs— and high school was not immune to the changing times. American high schools became the background for a whole host of epic power struggles. MTV made gods of the cool kids, and made everyone else a bunch of losers. Popular vs not, nerds vs jocks— young people felt the pressure to label and divide themselves the same way the grownups did. As someone who survived that time, the scars it left are deep...which is partly why I was reticent to return to it with this musical! That said, I am honored to be part of this production of Heathers by Lawrence O'Keefe and Kevin Murphy. Heathers delves into the intricacies of teenage life, love, and the darker aspects of adolescence. Since the original film's release in 1988, Veronica's story is a parable, exploring what happens when a teenage girl gives into the dark-side. This production is not only a showcase of our students' talent, but an opportunity to reflect on the issues faced by young people today, just as it was with the class of 1989. I'm so proud of our students for taking on this musical as a classroom project, and for seeing it through with energy, class, and integrity. I'm particularly grateful to the student designers and leaders who helped to bring it all together. We have worked together as a team to conceptualize and create the production you will see tonight, and we are hopeful that you will leave this evening feeling optimistic for the future of this generation and maybe even the next.

Productions entered on the Participating level are eligible for invitation to the KCACTF regional festival and may also be considered for national awards recognizing outstanding achievement in production, design, direction and performance. Last year more than 1,500 productions were entered in the KCACTF involving more than 200,000 students nationwide. By entering this production, our theater department is sharing in the KCACTF goals to recognize, reward, and celebrate the exemplary work produced in college and university theaters across the nation.
