Director's Note

Welcome to our production of *Rosencrantz and Guildenstern Are Dead*, a witty existential journey through Shakespeare's *Hamlet* like you have never experienced before. At the play's epicenter, it is an exploration of the absurd, the paradoxical nature of existence, and a meditation on the consequences of our actions over time.

The play follows traditional absurdist theatrical conventions, so don't expect a traditional linear story- Stoppard takes us on a sometimes cyclical, meandering trek through the consciousness of Rosencrantz and Guildenstern. Characters appearing in unexpected places, layered word play, and unconventional use of time and space are all standard protocol within the play Stoppard has crafted.

If you're a Shakespeare lover, you will have a chance to see some familiar characters such as Hamlet, Ophelia, Claudius, and Gertrude, but we will meet and experience them through the disjointed lens of Rosencrantz and Guildenstern's journey to the gallows.

The physical staging of this particular production takes great inspiration from the philosophical concept of Eternal Recurrence. This is Fredrich Nietzsche's idea that everything in our universe, including every event and experience, will repeat infinitely and identically, forever in an eternal loop. This thought experiment forces us to examine the choices we make in everyday life. If they were to be experienced in a repetitive cycle forever, would we still make those same decisions? Food for thought. This guides us toward the idea that it is our own decision-making and the consequences of those decisions that yield the true meaning and significance of our lives in an otherwise indifferent universe.

This is what Stoppard's play challenges the audience to wrestle with, all while being incased within playful language, witty humor, and the occasional pirate. Yes,.. There will be pirates.

Finally, I want to thank the immensely talented team of young artists who worked on this production. Their dedication to this project has been unwavering. The energy, thought, care, and artistry has been a delight to work alongside. This company has continually approached this challenging work with an attitude of engagement, curiosity, and a willingness for playful exploration. We can't wait to share this work with you!
