### ARTS AND SCIENCES

Dr. Jerry Mebane returns from sabbatical to teach Winter Quarter after completing his book Art and Magic in English Renaissance Drama: The Occult Tradition in Marlowe, Greene, Jonson, and Shakespeare.

### BUSINESS

The National Association of Accountants will again offer a TSD scholarship this year. Last spring the Association awarded a cash prize and a medal for the top students in accounting. Details for this year's award and entry dates will be announced early next year.

### EDUCATION

Students are completing student teaching internships in 17 schools in Coffee, Dale, Geneva, Houston, Miller, and Seminole counties. Dr. Majors travels regularly to each location supervising students and working with the local school systems.
