#### ARTS AND SCIENCES

During the Winter Quarter, Dr. Eugene Bergquist's BIO 100 class visited the electron microscope lab at the U.S. Army Aeronautical Research Laboratory (USAARL) at Fort Rucker. Capt. Jim Fulbrook of Fort Rucker conducted the tour. The BIO 307/507 class visited the lab the following day.

Dr. Mary Brown participated in a workshop at Christian Brothers College in Memphis, Tenn., during the break between the Winter and Spring Quarters. The workshop dealt with the use of computers in science teaching.

Dr. Priscilla McArthur plans to finish a book entitled Arkansans and the California Gold Rush by the end of the summer. The Arkansas Territorial Restoration will publish her book upon completion. The research material for the book comes from letters and diaries not published before and material published during that period of time. Dr. McArthur says, "It is time to help Arkansas celebrate its 150th birthday of statehood."

Dr. Jerry Mebane presented a paper at the National Convention of the Shake-speare Association of America in Cambridge Mass. Dr. Mebane was asked to be a principle speaker for the program on Teaching Shakespeare to Undergraduates: Problems and Approaches. The title of his paper was "Teaching Interpretive Skills Through Testing in Shakespeare Courses."

Dr. Mebane has also been selected as a participant for a summer seminar for college teachers on Literature and History in the Seventeenth Century. The summer seminar is funded by the National Endowment for the Humanities and will be held at the University of Chicago June 18 - August 10.

Dr. Jack Sublette has been commissioned to write an article on Shakespeare to be included in the Professor A.A. Ansari Commemorative Volume. The collection of articles is being prepared to honor Professor Ansari, the founder and editor of The Aligarh Journal of English Studies, a journal in which Sublette has previously published two Shakespeare articles.

Dr. Sublette has also been chosen by the Alabama Committee for the Humanities to lead a series of Shakespeare seminars this summer in Dothan. Funded by the National Endowment for the Humanities and sponsored by the Alabama Committee for the Humanities, the Alabama Shakespeare Festival, and the Alabama Public Library Service, the seminars will be part of a state-wide series of seminars in public libraries that will allow the general public to study Shakespeare and his works. The seminars will meet four times at the Houston-Love Memorial Library and once in Anniston to see a performance of either Macbeth or Love's Labour's Lost and discuss the play.

### EDUCATION

Dr. Mary Jo Pollman was a presenter at the Southern Association on Children Under Six Conference in Lexington, Ky, March 9. Dr. Pollman spoke on Dramatic Play and its effect on reading Readiness. Creative dramatic play centers were shown on slides and discussed in terms of how they promote reading readiness. Diagnostic/prescriptive teaching through dramatic play experiences was also examined.

Dr. Pollman has also been working as Regional Coordinator of Alabama Association for Young Children. Dr. Pollman coordinated the activities for the Week of the Young Child held April 8-15. Mayor Everett declared April 8-15 as the Week of the Young Child during ceremonies at the city commissioners' meeting on March 27, 1984. Approximately twenty businesses sponsored activities including the Troy State Dothan Library, Reading Center, Child Center and three free parent workshops were conducted by Troy State graduate students. Drs. Fritchie, Majors, and Mohundro each set up displays on the second floor centered around the theme of the Week: "Children: Our Greatest Resource." Dr. Pollman also spoke to the Dothan and Dale County Lions Clubs concerning the importance of a good preschool program.

Dr. Leonard Roberts spoke to the Dothan Lions Club on February 29. He discussed the Historical Roots of Violence in the Middle East.

Dr. Roberts will also speak to the Retired Persons Association on Monday, May 14. He will speak on Terrorism in Central America.

### BUSINESS

Mr. Buzz Wood recently provided an afternoon of in-service training on microcomputers to the faculty and staff of Rehobeth High School. The school, like other county educational institutions, is implementing a computer literacy program being established throughout the system. ### WORKSHOPS

Dr. Elizabeth Majors will hold a workshop for students and interns on May 12, 7:30 a.m. until 5:30 p.m. She will focus on several aspects of teaching, including: 1) classroom management techniques, and 2) improving skills in teaching science and language arts. The workshop will also aid students who are scheduled to take the State Exit Exam and who are hopeful of a classroom assignment in Early Childhood, Elementary or Secondary Education.

For the third consecutive year, the CIS Department will be providing a series of five computer workshops for young people, ranging from elementary age through high school.

Workshops consist of two-periods of classroom and computer laboratory work in BASIC language instruction, fundamentals of computer operation, design of meaningful programs, graphics, and in exposure to languages such as LOGO, Pascal and FORTRAN.

Elementary grade workshops are scheldued for June 11 and July 23. Middle school workshops will begin on June 25 and August 6. The one high school workshop will begin on July 9. The tuition for each workshop will again be \$50 per student, covering all costs and materials.
