ISL: AN UPDATE

Anyone who has recently peered through the glass door of Lamar's Pharmacy may have noticed a few changes. Computers and literacy posters have replaced the long rows of medical supplies. The old pharmacy is now the new home of TSUD's Instructional Support Laboratory, supported by Title III funds. Under the direction of Mrs. Sandra Carter, the ISL offers students a variety of study services. In addition to dedicated volunteer tutors, the ISL has an ever growing assortment of self-help materials.

Currently, the ISL offers computer tutorials on a limited basis within the lab. There is a self-paced module for 099 Math, which includes a textbook, student study guide and a self-paced book. Soon, there will be video tapes which cover each concept taught in this course. Also

available is a complete package of computer-assisted tutorials in the basic skills areas of math, reading, writing, and language. The "Bank Street Writer Plus" word processor will provide students with help in writing essays.

For students who need help with language skills, the ISL has a complete self-paced module which addresses phases of these skills from basic grammar to writing. This module features pre-tests and post-tests for each component so that students may see their progress.

As funds become available, the ISL will be adding to its inventory of self-help materials. Materials for literature classes are planned, and programs to aid students in preparing for standardized tests like the ACT will be purchased.
