TSUD HOLDS SECOND ANNUAL HONORS CONVOCATION

The First United Methodist Church of Dothan was filled to near capacity when many TSUD students, faculty, staff, and guests gathered to take part in the University's second annual Spring Honors convocation on Friday, May 5.

The program honored outstanding students, faculty, community members, and recognized various University organizations, honor graduates, students on the Dean's and President's Lists, and Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges.

Dr. Frederick Palmer Whiddon, President of the University of South Alabama, was the guest speaker.

Congratulations to the hard-working TSUD faculty members who received the Outstanding Faculty Award. This award is presented to one faculty member from each School or College who has made exemplary contributions in teaching, research, writing, and service to the University and/or community.

Recipients of this award are: Dr. Mary A.H. Brown, Professor in the College of Arts and Sciences; Ms. Dorothy Anderson, Assistant Professor of Finance in the School of Business; and Ms. Diane T. Murphy, Director of the Professional Internship Program for the School of Education.

In addition to the faculty and student honors, Com-

munity Service Awards were presented to Dr. Ralph W. Adams, Chancellor of the TSUD System; Mr. Stanhope Elmore; and the Equipment Platoon HHC 46th Engineer Battalion from Fort Rucker. These recipients were honored for their outstanding service to TSUD and to the Wiregrass community.

TSUD NAMES NEW BUILDINGS

The TSU Board of Trustees has voted to designate TSUD's two new buildings as "Ralph Wyatt Adams Hall" and "Wallace Davis Malone, Jr., Hall."

Adams Hall, which will house classrooms, the library, and the student center, was named in honor of Dr. Ralph W. Adams, the current Chancellor of the TSU System.

TSU System leaders stated that Adams has proven himself to be "an educational leader in this state and the nation, as evidenced by his designation as one of the one hundred most effective college presidents in the United States by the Exxon Education Foundation in 1986.

Dr. Adams foresaw the need to provide quality higher education in the Wiregrass region and has strived to answer that need through the establishment and enhancement of TSUD."

They added that naming a building for Adams was the permanent means possible to recognize and honor the Chancellor's foresight and accomplishments.

"I am honored that the Troy State University Board of Trustees named Dothan's new classroom, library and student

center building for me," responded Adams.

He added, "I realize that a building is nothing more than brick and mortar. However, this new building for Dothan will become an important part of the University.

It will be a place where students of all ages will come to learn and grow in understanding of themselves and the world around them. I am extremely proud that a facility with such a noble purpose will bear my name."

Malone Hall, the other new multipurpose building, was named in honor of Wallace Davis Malone, Jr., a Dothan native and president pro tempore of the TSU System Board of Trustees.

Mr. Malone has been an active proponent of higher education in the state including thirteen consecutive years of service to the TSU System. He has served as a member of the Board of Trustees since 1975, and as president pro tempore of the Board since 1980.

He has been a member of the TSU Foundation Board of Directors since 1968 and has served as its chairman since 1971.

In naming Malone Hall, the TSU Board of Trustees stated, "Because of Mr. Malone's infinite and tireless service to this state and to this University, this Board desires to recognize and honor his many contributions by permanent means."

Malone accepted the honor commenting, "I cannot adequately express how delighted I am at having one of the new buildings at Troy State University named after me.

Since Dothan is my hometown, this has a greater significance to me than probably for anyone else. I am very devoted and attached to Troy State University, and the naming of the building in my honor is something that I will cherish always."

PRESIDENT TO TEACH COURSE
