AREA JUNIOR COLLEGE COUNSELORS ATTEND WORKSHOP AT TSUD

Troy State University at Dothan hosted the Junior College Counselor, Advisor and Admissions Personnel workshop recently on the TSUD campus. The program was designed to provide better articulation and communication between area two-year colleges and Troy State University at Dothan personnel, primarily focusing on new programs and transfer issues of concern to all. The focus of the program was the new programs and new program changes as well as an examination of future programs that are being considered.

Dr. Thomas Harrison extended a welcome to all that attended the workshop. An introduction and overview of the program was given by Ms. Helen Livingston. TSUD administrators, deans, counselors, and student services personnel provided information from their respective areas that is vital in the transfer process from two-year institutions to TSUD.

Area junior colleges represented were: Enterprise State Junior College, Wallace Community College-Dothan, Bainbridge College, Lurleen B. Wallace Jr. College-Andalusia, Alabama Aviation and Technical College-Ozark, Andrew College-Cuthbert, GA, and Chipola Jr. College-Marianna, FL.

DR. FRITCHIE RECEIVES TWO DISTINGUISHED HONORS

At a recent meeting of the Wiregrass Reading Council on the TSUD campus, Dr. Patricia Fritchie was honored by having a scholarship named in her honor.

The Patricia P. Fritchie Scholarship will be awarded to an undergraduate or graduate student pursuing a degree in elementary education or reading certification.

Dr. Fritchie said, "I was surprised. It was a very emotional presentation and I'm very grateful for the honor."

Dr. Fritchie was honored with the 1991 President's Award for Outstanding Leadership and Distinguished Service at the 24th annual conference of the Alabama Reading Association (ARA) at Auburn University's Conference Center on October 12.

She served as state coordinator and International Reading Association liaison from 1986-1991. As state coordinator, Dr. Fritchie's primary responsibilities were to encourage quality local council leadership through leadership training and support services; to establish and maintain new local councils in previously unserved areas; and to maintain leadership rosters for local and state level council organizations. During the years that she served as state coordinator, she conducted 12 Leadership Training workshops.

The following new councils were chartered during her term of office:

Boll Weevil, Enterprise; Pike County, Troy; CARE, Capitol Area Reading Council, Montgomery; Tuscaloosa Reading Council, Tuscaloosa; Baldwin County Reading Council, Robertsedale; Patchwork, Huntsville; and Centralia, Montevallo.

To assist councils in Alabama to become more active and to lend support to them in their pursuit of International Reading Association's Honor Council status, Dr. Fritchie established a parallel award at the state level. Called the ALA-STARs Award and following similar guidelines as the national award, this honor was given to eight of the states 14 councils. Four of the 14 councils have received this award for four consecutive years.

Dr. Fritchie further served as ARA's Program Chairperson for the state's annual conference. The responsibilities included obtaining the keynote address, featured speaker, book and author luncheon speakers, seeking proposals, and selecting proposals for the breakout session presenters. She served in this capacity for the 1988, 1989, and 1990 conferences. During these conferences, Alabama teachers were afforded an opportunity to hear over 24 nationally published reading and language experts and three distinguished children's authors.

A member of the Alabama Reading Association's Board of Directors for eight years, Dr. Fritchie also served as a member of the executive board. When asked what was the most valuable experience of all of

these many and varied tasks, she replied, "The opportunity it gave to help provide the type of quality inservice experience that every Alabama teacher deserves and the chance to travel about the state and see what dedicated public school teachers are accomplishing in the teaching of reading and language."
