TSUD & SAMC JOIN EFFORTS

Troy State University at Dothan and the Southeast Alabama Medical Center/Manley L. Cummins School of Nurse Anesthesia have signed a cooperative agreement to offer the Nurse Anesthesia Concentration as an option within the Foundations of Education program in the Master of Science degree at TSUD.

The Master of Science degree in Foundations of Education provides students with a core of coursework in social foundations of education, psychological foundations of education and research.

The purpose of the Nurse Anesthesia Concentration is to provide the context in which professional leadership is developed and nurtured through the training of highly skilled practitioners who are prepared to plan, implement and teach the anesthetic process for a culturally diverse population. The graduates of this program are professional practitioners who understand both the humanity and science of anesthesia.

The benefits of the nurse anesthesia concentration are numerous. It is estimated that 60% of the graduates with this concentration will accept first clinical positions within 50 miles of Dothan and that 80% will accept first clinical positions in Alabama or nearby areas of southern Georgia and northern Florida. In the immediate area, the Manley L. Cummins School of Nurse Anesthesia has been supplying 95% of the nurse

anesthetists serving the Southeast Alabama Medical Center and 50% of the nurse anesthetists serving Flowers Hospital.

"Southeast Alabama Medical Center is excited about the cooperative agreement with Troy State University at Dothan, because it is through such agreements that increased levels of education are accomplished. The residents in our area will benefit because 80 percent of the graduates of this new program will accept their first clinical positions in the tri-state area," said James R. Blackmon, chief executive officer of the 400-bed regional referral center.

Dr. Jack Sublette, Executive Vice President at TSUD, stated, "TSUD is pleased to cooperate with the Cummins School of Nurse Anesthesia and the Southeast Alabama Medical Center in providing graduate education for those who wish to complete a master's degree with a concentration in nurse anesthesia. TSUD was able to meet an educational need in the community by modifying an existing program, and the Foundations of Education program is enhanced with the addition of the nurse anesthesia students."

"We find it gratifying to have the opportunity to share our resources, including our faculty, library, and facilities with the fine staff and organization at the Southeast Alabama Medical Center and the Cummins School of Nurse Anesthesia. I am proud to say that this cooperative agreement was reached because

people from both institutions worked diligently and conscientiously to see that it came about. The results of their efforts are that a new concentration in nurse anesthesia exists in the Foundations of Education program at the master's degree level," stated Dr. Thomas Harrison, TSUD President.

TUITION INCREASE FOR 1992-93

The Troy State University Board of Trustees recently approved the tuition structure of all of its campuses for 1992-93.

For Troy State University at Dothan, effective Fall Quarter 1992, tuition for an in-state undergraduate student taking 12-18 quarter hours will be \$539, which is a 10 percent increase over tuition for 1991-92. In-state graduate tuition is not increasing and will remain at \$49 per quarter hour.

Undergraduate out-of-state tuition will increase to \$916.50 for the student taking 12-18 quarter hours. Graduate out-of-state tuition will increase by 6.5 percent to \$83.50 per quarter hour.

Residents of Clay, Early, Miller, and Seminole Counties in Georgia and residents of Holmes, Jackson, and Washington Counties in Florida will pay in-state tuition.

The increases in tuition were necessitated by rising operating expenses and the second consecutive year of a prorated state appropriation.

Dr. Jack Sublette, TSUD Executive Vice President, said, "The larger than usual undergraduate in-state tuition increase was necessary as we continue to provide quality programs and services for the citizens of the Wiregrass region during hard economic times. We were pleased not to raise in-state graduate tuition." Sublette continued, "The increases in tuition at colleges and universities throughout the state of Alabama dramatize the need for revenue-positive tax reform. When the state appropriation is cut, students must pay a higher share of the cost of their education. The burden is particularly heavy for TSUD students, many of whom are working adults who support their own families and pay for their children's education."

LOVRICH NAMED TO NEW POSITION

Dr. Frank M. Lovrich has been named as Vice President for Academic Affairs and Dean of the Graduate School at Troy State University at Dothan. Dr. Lovrich has been employed with TSUD since 1976, serving as professor of sociology, Director of Institutional Research and Planning, and since June 1991 as Acting Vice President for Academic Affairs.

Lovrich received a B.A. degree in social science-sociology from Southeastern Louisiana State University; a M.A. degree in sociology-history from the University of South Dakota; a Ph.D. degree in so-

cial science from South Dakota State University; and has done post doctoral work in sociology and anthropology at the University of Colorado and UCLA.

Since assuming the responsibilities as chief academic officer in June 1991, Dr. Lovrich has witnessed substantial changes in many academic areas at TSUD.

Growth and change are evident on the TSUD campus as enrollment continues to climb quarterly not only in the day and evening classes but also in the Weekend University and telecourse offerings. TSUD looks to expand selected TV course offerings even further with the cooperation of FOX/34 and Alabama Public Television.

A microwave linkage within the Troy State University System is in the final stages of completion and when operational will allow the sharing of courses and programs throughout the system campuses.

In December 1991 a cooperative agreement was established with Southeast Alabama Medical Center/Manley L. Cummins School of Nurse Anesthesia to develop a Nurse Anesthesia Concentration within the Foundation of Education program in the Master of Science degree at TSUD. This agreement will help meet personnel needs in the Wiregrass medical community.

By Fall Quarter 1992, the School of Business at TSUD will offer an Executive MBA Concentration within the Master of Business Administration degree program. This concentration is structured to meet specific needs of professionals from a variety of backgrounds.

"The School of Education is in the planning stages to develop and offer a special education program at the Dothan campus," remarked Lovrich. "We will be offering a graduate physical education course this spring quarter and another this summer through a cooperative venture with Troy State University-Troy," he added.

"My largest task, and this will take some time to implement, is working with the fine people in our area tech-

nical and community colleges to reevaluate our Bachelor of Applied Science Degree and develop programs in technology and in health science management. This will permit the citizens of this region to complete a bachelor's degree plus more advanced course work that will assist them in the job market, as well as making them more valuable in the positions they hold," Lovrich said.

"More and more of our citizens are seeing Troy State University at Dothan as the regional university for the Wiregrass area plus the seven contiguous counties in Georgia and Florida. The University's mission and role are to meet the educational, service, and applied science needs of its citizens," Lovrich said. "I, along with the administration at TSUD, am aware that there are program needs, but because of constraints, both economical and political, it will be a struggle to meet the existing and emerging needs of this rapidly growing area," he added.

Lovrich said that he has been very impressed with the full-time faculty at TSUD, of whom some 80 percent possess terminal degrees in their field. "The faculty has done all we have asked and more, and we have been very fortunate in being able to acquire excellent adjunct faculty to supplement our full-time staff," Lovrich said.

Lovrich went on to say that he was pleased with the morale of the faculty at TSUD. Even with no salary increase for the previous year, faculty continue to be involved with professional development activities, research, and publications. "It's been a pleasure working with this type of dedicated and talented faculty," he said.

Lovrich said he will continue to have an "open door" policy. "My role as an administrator is to be a facilitator for the faculty; to make it easier for them to do their job in the classroom. I believe in collegiality, which promotes innovation, creativity, and a sense of community.
