TSUD HAS SIGNIFICANT ENROLLMENT INCREASE FOR SPRING QUARTER

Troy State University at Dothan officials announce the final enrollment figures for Spring Quarter 1992—2,125 students. For the nineteenth consecutive quarter, TSUD has shown an increase in enrollment over the same quarter of the previous year with a 10.3 percent increase over the 1991 Spring Quarter figure.

At traditional residential colleges spring quarter enrollment is usually smaller than that for fall and winter quarters. However, with TSUD's predominantly non-traditional student body and the large number of transfer students, enrollment patterns at TSUD are not necessarily typical of those at other institutions.

According to Tony Whetstone, Director of University Relations at TSUD, "Because of the stagnant economy, many people are returning to school to upgrade degrees and skills to obtain a possible promotion on the job, and more of the Wiregrass students are returning home to attend school because it is more affordable."

Dr. Jack Sublette, Executive Vice President and Vice President for Student Affairs and Development at TSUD, says, "This quarter's enrollment increase reflects the fact that TSUD has programs and services which the citizens of the Wiregrass region need. The large increase for spring also indicates that we are doing a better job of disseminating information about TSUD."

DR. SUBLETTE TO ATTEND INSTITUTE AT HARVARD

Dr. Jack R. Sublette, Executive Vice President and Vice President for Student Affairs and Development at Troy State University at Dothan, has been selected as one of approximately 75 participants to attend the Institute for the Management of Lifelong Education. The Institute will be held at Harvard University in Cambridge, Massachusetts, June 7-19, 1992. The Institute is intended for upper-level administrators who are leading the way toward a "learning society"—making innovative, responsive educational opportunities available to a wide variety of learners.

With a focus on adult development and learning, management strategies, and organizational leadership and change, the curriculum is designed to accomplish three objects: introduce new concepts that have immediate, practical application to the participant's work; encourage participants to expand their

focus beyond the internal issues in their own organization; promote both professional and personal development by offering opportunities to be a "reflective practitioner."

The Institute is designed for men and women who lead organizations that serve non-traditional learners. The Institute faculty are drawn from Harvard University, with outstanding guest faculty from all around the country. Each participant is housed at the Cronkrite Graduate Center of Radcliffe College with classes held at the Harvard Graduate School of Education.

"I am excited about the opportunity to attend this prestigious institute and represent TSUD at Harvard," said Sublette. "This particular institute is most appropriate for me because of TSUD's non-traditional student body. I have been advised that the workload is heavy and that my time will be well occupied. I look forward to learning, meeting new colleagues, and returning to TSUD to share what I have learned."

FACTS IN BRIEF

MORE STUDENTS EARNING MASTER'S DEGREES

(Prepared by the American Council on Education's Division of Policy Analysis and Research.)

The number of master's degrees awarded annually has quadrupled in the last three decades, from fewer than 75,000 in 1960 to more than 337,000 in 1991. A substantial portion of this growth can be traced to increases in practice-or career-oriented fields, such as education, business, engineering, public affairs, and the health professions.

Gains in the 1980s were due primarily to an increase in the number of foreign students earning master's degrees. From 1979 to 1989, the number of conferred master's degrees increased slightly (by 3 percent), from 300,000 to nearly 309,000, but this growth was due largely to the 75 percent rise in the number of non-U.S. citizens earning master's degrees. During this period, the number of master's degrees awarded to the U.S. citizens actually declined by 2 percent.

Minority representation among master's recipients changed little from 1979 to 1989, growing from 10 percent to 11 percent.

How does TSUD compare to national trends? From 1979 to 1989, the number of conferred master's degrees decreased by 33 percent, from 183 to 122. From 1989 to 1991, the number of conferred master's degrees increased by 39 percent, to 170.

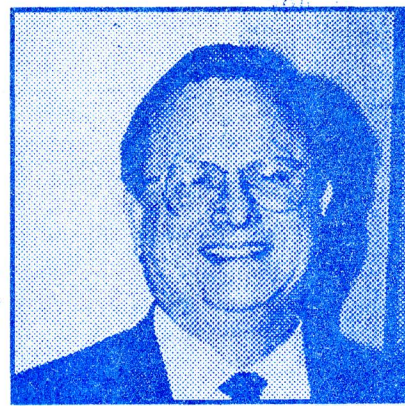

Dr. Harrison made the following remarks: TSUD continues to investigate accreditation for programs at the University; a TSU System committee is looking at computer services; Alabama State University has filed a legal brief asking that TSUM be closed; spring quarter enrollment figures are outstanding; and faculty/staff morale is very good.

Dr. Lovrich attended a meeting of the Council of Graduate Deans at Gulf Shores and gave a report on the meeting.

Dr. Sublette distributed and reviewed a "Summary of Results of New Student Questionnaires." The

summary covered the past six consecutive quarters (Summer 1990 through Winter 1992).

Dr. Harrison introduced a video entitled "Multiculturalism in Educational Improvement," which was taped at the SACS Annual Meeting in December.

The meeting concluded with update reports from all in attendance.

Computer Utilization Committee

The Computer Utilization Committee met on April 23 in the Conference Room of Malone Hall. The following objectives were discussed: status of the updated computer and hardware inventory; the new Continuing Education computer lab; and future goals of the Committee.

The Committee discussed a summary of academic computer usage and how the University might best use this information for future accreditation reviews. Dr. Goodman and Dr. Deavers gave an update report on status of new software and hardware acquisitions for the University and the Continuing Education Center.

Dr. Buchanan will report on the status of the acquisition of new hardware and software for the TSU System at the next meeting during summer quarter.
