GROWTH TREND CONTINUES FOR TSUD

Troy State University at Dothan and its Fort Rucker location have again experienced significant growth in student enrollment for the 1993 Winter Quarter. Enrollment figures stand at 2,390 (including unduplicated headcount from winter interim), an 11.0 percent increase over the 1992 Winter Quarter. This marks twenty-two consecutive quarters of increased enrollment at TSUD and the largest enrollment in the history of the University.

At traditional residential colleges, winter quarter enrollment is usually smaller than that for fall quarter. However, with TSUD's predominantly non-traditional student body, enrollment patterns at TSUD are not necessarily typical of those at other institutions. TSUD's enrollment for the 1993 Winter Quarter exceeds that of fall quarter by 3%.

Dr. Frank Lovrich, Vice President for Academic Affairs at TSUD, said, "With the increase of enrollment over the past several quarters, the problem of available space has also increased." Although it seems to be a good problem to experience, Lovrich said that the crisis is yet to come. "Our contingency plan will be scheduling classes earlier in the morning and utilizing more space at the Northside Mall location. The crisis for space will come when the University begins to develop and introduce new and much needed

programs in the areas of special education, allied health, and technology," remarked Lovrich. He added, "More and more people are realizing the importance of an education, and the word is spreading about the upgrading of our full-time and adjunct faculty. Students are finding they can receive a quality education without having to leave the area."

Dr. Jack Sublette, Executive Vice President and Vice President for Student Affairs and Development at TSUD, commented, "Students continue to enroll in increasing numbers because they know that TSUD offers the programs, facilities, and services necessary for a quality education."

TSU BOARD OF TRUSTEES MEET IN DOTHAN

Troy State University Board of Trustees approved key resolutions at its meeting at the TSUD campus on January 26. The resolutions included the approval of the purchase of property owned by the Alabama Baptist Children's Home that is contiguous to the campus in Troy, approval of the construction of a new classroom building at the TSU-Phenix City campus, and approval of a tuition adjustment throughout the TSU System.

In reference to the tuition adjustment, Dr. Thomas Harrison, TSUD President commented, "The 5% increase will assist us in employing needed additional faculty in the areas of special education, science, and accounting. Plans are to use the additional revenue to add to the library holdings and to assist in the area of faculty professional development." The tuition increase will be effective Fall Quarter 1993.

This was the first time the TSU. Board of Trustees had met on the new TSUD campus.

CONTINUING EDUCATION RECEIVES AWARD

Troy State University at Dothan Continuing Education and Ann Wells were presented the Community Awareness Award by the Retired Senior Volunteer Program and the Substance Abuse Board. TSUD Continuing Education has been actively involved with activities for older adults since 1990. Ann Wells, through the Houston County Health Council, has chaired the Coping with the Aging Process seminar held on the TSUD main campus in 1991 and at the Continuing Education Center in 1992. These conferences have been well attended by older adults and their caregivers because information is provided to improve their quality of living. TSUD has also provided space for the Substance Abuse Conference for Older Adults this past year.

TSUD TO HOST CAREER DAY '93

Troy State University at Dothan will be hosting Career Day '93 on Wednesday, February 10, 1993, from 10:00 a.m.-1:00 p.m. This event, spon-

sored by the Office of Counseling Services, will be held in Malone Hall.

More than thirty area businesses and school systems will have representatives available to answer students' questions about academic majors required in their organizations, types of jobs available and the future outlook for those jobs, and the products and services they offer.

University at Dothan, has been recognized as the "Faculty Member of the Month" for the School of Education.




