TSUD COMES TO MARIANNA

Officials from Troy State University at Dothan (TSUD) and Chipola Junior College (CJC) met Wednesday, June 2, 1993, and signed a cooperative agreement enabling TSUD to offer courses on the CJC campus.

Beginning Fall Quarter 1993, Troy State University at Dothan and Chipola Junior College will agree to an affiliation for coordinated programs. TSUD, licensed by the Florida State Board of Independent Colleges and Universities, will provide necessary upper division undergraduate and graduate course work to satisfy TSUD's requirements for three initial academic programs including: 1) Bachelor of Science degree with a major in criminal justice; 2) Bachelor of Science in Business Administration degree with a major in management; and 3) Master of Science degree in the counseling and psychology program with concentrations in agency counseling and in corrections counseling.

At a scheduled press conference on the CJC campus, Dr. Jerry Kandzer, CJC President, offered comments regarding the invitation extended to TSUD to offer upper division courses leading to bachelor's and master's degree programs to be held on the Chipola Junior College campus. In response, Dr. Thomas Harrison, TSUD President, remarked that TSUD was very pleased to be able to serve the stu-

dent population in the Marianna and northwest Florida area and, at the invitation of CJC, was pleased to bring TSUD to the Chipola campus.

Dr. Earl Carroll, Dean of Academic and Student Services at CJC, and Dr. Frank Lovrich, Vice President for Academic Affairs at TSUD, commented on the programs that are scheduled to be offered and the transferability of CJC courses into the degree programs at TSUD.

Dr. Debbie Goodman, Dean of Special Programs at TSUD, presented information regarding the activities leading to today's milestone. She commented on the administering of the TSUD/CJC Needs Assessment Survey and the findings that led to the determination of the educational needs of the student population in the CJC service area.

In closing, Dr. Helen Livingston, Director of TSUD at FCI-Marianna/CJC, provided information concerning student enrollment procedures and class offerings to be held Fall Quarter 1993. Following the press conference, the Marianna Chamber of Commerce hosted a ribbon cutting ceremony.

TUITION EQUALIZED FOR FORT RUCKER LOCATION OF TSUD

Effective Fall Interim Session 1993 and subsequent quarters, the cost of tuition at the Fort Rucker location of Troy State University at Dothan will be equalized with the cost of tuition at the Dothan campus. This is the first time in the history of TSUD and the operation at Fort Rucker for tuition to be equalized and is a result of TSUD receiving state funding for the first time for the Fort Rucker location.

An undergraduate student taking 12 - 18 quarter hours will pay \$565.50 compared to the previous cost ranging from \$582.00 to \$873.00, depending on the number of quarter hours taken. Graduate students will pay \$52.50 per credit hour compared to \$52.00 previously. This minimal in-

Students are reminded that attendance at the TSUD Fort Rucker location is not restricted to military personnel. Dependents and civilians are encouraged to attend.


