TSUD TO OFFER TECHNOLOGY PROGRAM FOR ALABAMA TEACHERS

Troy State University at Dothan has been chosen as one of several graduate institutions in Alabama to offer the Technology Scholarship Program for Alabama Teachers (TSPAT).

TSPAT is a new state-funded student aid program that provides tuition and fee assistance to certified, employed Alabama public school teachers to be trained in the use of integrating technology skills in the curriculum. Awards are available for teachers who are pursuing or who already have a master's degree.

Applications will be processed each term on a first-come, firstserved basis as long as funds remain available. Twenty-five percent (25%) of available funds will be targeted for minority teachers. The student will have to pay if tuition is less than \$100.00 and/or where tuition assistance and other scholarship money is available. First priority will be given to those teachers in the fields of English, science, mathematics, social science and history, and those who teach pupils in kindergarten to grade six (K-6) inclusive. The TSPAT pays all tuition and fees (55 hours) for students working toward the master's degree in education; teachers who already have a master's degree and wish to update their computer skills

may receive awards to cover technology courses only. TSUD will offer EDU 655—Computer-based Instructional Technology—during the 1994 Winter Quarter. The other two courses, EDU 656—Current and Emerging Instructional Technology and EDU 657—Curriculum Integration of Technology, will be offered spring and summer quarter, respectively.

Interested individuals should call the Alabama Commission on Higher Education (ACHE) at 281-1921, and ask to speak to Mrs. Addie Ward, who will take names and addresses and mail applications for the TSPAT program. All applications and information concerning this program will be handled through the ACHE office at this time.

UNITED WAY CAMPAIGN EXCEEDS GOAL

Ms. Marilyn Barnes, director of institutional advancement at Troy State University at Dothan, announced recently that the faculty and staff at TSUD had exceeded their United Way Campaign goal of \$3,500.00 for a total of \$4,225.12. This is a 26% increase over the total from last year's campaign. "This is my first year to head the University campaign, and I was extremely pleased to report our results at the final report meeting recently," stated Barnes.

FALL COMMENCEMENT EXERCISE HELD

Troy State University at Dothan held its Fall Commencement Ceremony at 10:00 a.m. on Thursday, December 2, in the Dothan Civic Center. A reception for faculty, staff, graduates, and families preceded the ceremony.

Dr. Jerry Kandzer, president of Chipola Junior College in Marianna, was the commencement speaker.

TSUD granted 291 degrees for the summer and fall quarters. Of this number, 166 graduates participated in the Fall Commencement Exercise.

STUDENTS AWARDED FIRST CERTIFICATES

The Continuing Education Center at Troy State University at Dothan has awarded its first certificates in the Child Care Certification program and the American Management Association (AMA) Certificate in Management program.

Child care certification can be obtained from TSUD, an approved site to offer Child Development Associate (CDA) training. An individual can receive certification as a day care director, program director, or child care center director.

Five students recently completed the required course work and received their child care center director certification, which involves 60 hours of child care training in 12 different subject areas. TSUD and the American Management Association (AMA) have developed a multi-course curriculum specifically designed to meet the unique needs of business professionals. Courses are designed to help individuals become more effective in present positions and better prepared for future advancement.

The first graduate of the AMA certificate program at TSUD received his certification recently. This program involves 95 hours of course work in six areas.

FROM MONTGOMERY...

WORKFORCE TELECONFERENCE GREAT SUCCESS

TSUM's first teleconference was an effective demonstration of how a university can work together with government and the business community to form partnerships to meet the training needs of our workforce. It was well attended by representatives of businesses, government, and education institutions in the area as well as TSUM faculty and staff.

The teleconference, "New Opportunities in Workforce Education," was held November 17, and was co-sponsored by TSUM and the Montgomery Area Chamber of Commerce as a community service. The live and interactive seminar was beamed via satellite by the Public

Broadcasting System to TSUM's television facility in Montgomery and was viewed on two large television screens especially installed for the capacity crowd in the Civic Room of Whitley Hall.

A second teleconference, "Model Partnership for Workforce Education," is scheduled for March 3, 1994.

FROM TROY...

As of this publication time, the Trojans of TSU are preparing for the NCAA I-AA semi-final showdown with Marshall University. This will be the first meeting between the two schools. The Trojans kept their undefeated record intact and national championship hopes alive last week in Lake Charles, LA, with a 35-28 win over McNeese State. The TSU-Marshall game can be seen on Prime-Network (SportsSouth) at 2:30 p.m., central time on Saturday, December 11.

Marshall University, the defending national champions, have been in the playoffs each of the last three years. Troy State has scored 223 points in the last five games, an average of 44.6 points per game. On the year, TSU is averaging 37.2 points, allowing 15.6.

Troy State's Larry Blakeney is 27-7-1 in his third year as coach at TSU. The Trojans are unbeaten in 17 straight games and have won 22 of their last 24. If TSU wins the semifinal game it will play the winner of the Idaho-Youngstown State game for the NCAA Division I-AA National Championship.



DIFFERENT-BUT THE SAME

Teaching at the Federal Corrections Institution (FCI) in Marianna has been a most rewarding experience for me during Fall Quarter 1993. Apprehensive at first, my anxiety disappeared after being there the first night. Admittedly, having to wear a body alarm while teaching makes one aware of his or her surroundings initially, but as all teachers know, we see students as students and we assess their performance on academic progress, not upon their outside endeavors.

At each class meeting, the students themselves were either waiting outside the education building or were already in the classroom waiting to begin. Eager to learn, each inmate came to class having read assignments, prepared work to be shared, and ready with many questions—not so different from many of our TSUD students. Looking ahead to future assignments and actually requesting additional work to address specific writing needs were issues often discussed.

Needless to say, class discussions were interesting and quite lively. One might assume the topics would stray toward the students' criminal background, and certainly at times this did happen. They are quite candid about their reasons for being there, but we did not dwell on that. Discussions centered on readings and sample essays with life experiences similar to many of yours and mine.

One memorable discussion concerned diversity. The class had read "Private Language, Public Language" by Richard Rodriguez. Since several of my students were Hispanic, they had keen insight into the concept of their private language of Spanish as opposed to their public language of English. All recognized the need for bilingual education in the schools, but even among them they disagreed. Two students stressed particularly that survival in the world outside of Miami demanded that one be able to communicate effectively in English. The greatest lesson we all learned that night was appreciation of diversity should be acknowledged not only among cultures but also within a culture.

Had the inmates not been dressed in all regulation khaki, I would have totally forgotten where I was. Their concerns of time management, academic stress, and family concerns echoed the TSUD non-traditional student's. Each inmate has a job where he works daily for a certain number of hours at particular times; each inmate reports for meals at a certain time; each inmate has family concerns, and visitation is a big event for them; each inmate must budget study time. One major difference is that their restrictions are not negotiable. There is no flexibility in scheduling; there is no choice of study area; there is no availability of computers for writing papers; there is restricted time as well as accessibility to types of library material requested.

These students want to learn, and to do so is to deal with much frustration at times. The effort, the intelligence, the drive, and the motivation are present within them. A college professor coming to teach them is both appreciated and respected. The inmates learn, question, analyze, produce, and apply what they are learning as the quarter continues. They are ready to learn, and teaching at FCI was a most rewarding personal and professional experience.

The Library staff has again survived another busy quarter. Many people (even University staff) do not realize how many hours the library is open during each quarter. Monday-Thursday, the Library is open from 8 a.m.-9 p.m.; Friday, 8 a.m.-4 p.m.; Saturday, 9 a.m.-5 p.m.; and Sunday, 1 p.m.-5 p.m. That's 72 hours per week!

The Library staff serves not only TSUD students and staff during these times, but also serves individuals through reciprocal agreements with several libraries in the area. These include Houston-Love Memorial Library, Wallace Community College, Chipola Junior College, and the Alabama Aviation and Technical College. Patrons at any of these facilities have borrowing privileges at the TSUD Library. TSUD patrons may use their facilities by presenting a valid TSUD library card or other identification to show they are presently enrolled at TSUD.

WATCHING OUT FOR THE OTHER GUY!

On an average weekend evening, approximately 1 out of 10 drivers is legally impaired or drunk. Any time of day or night, use seat belts, and be alert to signs of a drunk driver, such as:

- Unusually wide turns
- Weaving, swerving
- Hugging the center line, or driving left of center
- Excessively fast or slow speeds
- Stopping suddenly without apparent cause
- Inconsistent turn signals
- Driving with headlights off in the dark

 Driving with windows rolled down in cold weather, or driver with head out of window (laugh now...it won't be funny if he hits you)

If a driver ahead of you seems impaired, don't try to pass. Maintain extra distance, and be prepared to stop suddenly.

If the driver is behind you, turn right at the next intersection to let him get ahead of you.

If the driver is coming toward you, slow down, move to the right, and stop.

TIPS FOR PARTY GIVERS

If you are hosting a holiday party:

 Have someone tend bar, so guests do not over serve themselves.

- Serve plenty of food, since snacks can slow down the rate at which the body absorbs alcohol.
- Offer a choice of non-alcohol beverages.
- Stop serving alcohol at least one hour before the party is expected to end.

If you serve a punch containing alcohol, use a noncarbonated base such as fruit juice. The body absorbs alcohol faster when mixed with carbonation.

If you observe a guest drinking too much: engage him/her in conversation to slow down the drinking; offer high protein food; and offer to make the next drink using less alcohol - mix it with a noncarbonated base.
