TSUD INITIATES EDUCATIONAL LEADERSHIP PROGRAM

Troy State University at Dothan has received approval from the State Board of Education to offer courses in the newly developed Education Leadership Program (EDL). The program was designed primarily for the preparation of school leaders who can function effectively to meet the changing dimensions of leadership expectations. Secondary to this primary emphasis is the preparation of individuals who will assume leadership responsibilities in the community and region and who will be committed to life-long learning.

To be admitted to the EDL Program at TSUD, students must previously have earned a master's degree in a teaching field, school counseling, school psychometry, or library/media and have three years experience, one of which must be in teaching.

At the master's level, certification for the EDL program consists of twenty-seven (27) quarter hours in six areas: (1) educational leadership; (2) educational organization, management, and development; (3) curriculum development and instructional processes; (4) legal issues and community relations; (5) communication and technology; and (6) on-site internship.

The sixth-year program requires the completion of the Education Specialist degree and is a fifty or fifty-five hour program. This program offers advanced opportunities in school finance and taxation, person-

nel processes, organization and administrative behavior, seminars, problem analysis and implementation, mentor training, school-based experiences, and the completion of a written thesis.

The merging of knowledge, processes, and practices in the EDL program ensures that graduates of the program can be effective leaders because they are prepared to be informed decision-makers. They can also be effective leaders in multicultural environments.

CHAPTER ESTABLISHED

The TSUD Chapter of the American Association of University Professors (AAUP) was established by holding the first and organizational meeting of a sufficient number of active national members of AAUP at TSUD on February 24, 1994.

Other members of AAUP who did not attend this meeting are urged to join this local chapter. Dr. Robert Long and Dr. Dennis Coffey were selected to serve as president and secretary-treasurer, respectively, for the present time. Faculty members should contact either of these officers to pay nominal local membership dues of five dollars for the first year. Officers also have information regarding the national AAUP organization and membership.

The national office of AAUP has extended a special one-half charge on dues for the first year promotion to TSUD faculty for the present organization period.

MENTORING PROGRAM TO BEGIN

All faculty, staff, and administration should have received a survey seeking their participation in the TSUD Mentoring Program. I want to thank the 25 faculty and staff who have responded positively thus far. This is an excellent group to start this process on the TSUD campus. More information concerning dates for training will be disseminated soon.

Mentoring addresses the whole person. Everyone is made up of six parts, which are social, intellectual, physical, occupational, spiritual, and emotional. This is referred to as the wellness wheel, when we look at satisfying all six parts in order to be happy, satisfied, well. If any one part is not being satisfied, we focus on it instead of anything else. The mentor program is designed to have people work with those who are not happy, who have one or more parts of themselves not satisfied. One aspect of the campus plan for retention is going to focus on mentors working with at-risk students, people from all areas of the campus' activities and services, focusing on helping those who are not well.

Mentoring refers to a process in which caring people assist others to think about ideas and feelings, to explore alternatives to situations, and to make responsible decisions. The term "mentor" has been used synonymously with peer facilitator,

peer tutor, volunteer assistant, Big Brother or Big Sister, etc. Mentoring makes some basic assumptions about human beings and the ways in which individuals tend to cope with life's challenges. It also focuses on a set of interpersonal skills, which support those who are trying to make decisions, set goals, and take responsibility for their actions. With appropriate training, mentors can go beyond being just a friend, a shoulder to cry on, a considerate listener. Sometimes an immediate and short, personal contact with a trained mentor is all that is needed to encourage or support someone in a particular situation. Often, it is simply a matter of clarifying ideas of providing appropriate information. At other times, a more-in-depth or extended intervention is necessary. Under these circumstances, recognizing their limitations and responsibilities, mentors refer students to professionals in the field.

Mentoring is an opportunity for students to interact with positive role models and to develop closeness and trusting interpersonal relationships; a caring, sharing, listening experience for both giver and receiver; something which can address academic as well as other concerns; an alternative way of reaching students and utilizing untapped resources; an opportunity to foster improved self image and more responsible decision making among participants; a stimulant to help students to recognize and solve their own problems; a chance to have a positive impact on the overall campus climate.

Mentoring is not a cure-all, a source of advice or solutions, a moralizing agent for pushing personal values on students, a substitute for professional guidance, an attempt to provide therapy or "armchair psychology," simply a buzz session, gripe session, or opportunity for a free period, exclusively for problem students, an enterprise in which people are expected to "save" students.

The individuals who have volunteered to become mentors and undergo training will be rewarded both personally and professionally.

HEALTHY READING: BALANCING YOUR DIET

Here's some good news for you food lovers. Eating a healthy diet doesn't mean giving up foods that taste good. It does mean knowing what's in the foods you eat so you can have balance in your diet.

Below are three basic ways you can make changes to help balance your diet. Think about your own food preferences and decide on changes you can comfortably make.

1. **Choose foods** such as fat free or reduced fat dairy products, high fiber cereal and sugar free beverages and desserts. These foods can help you achieve your dietary goals while still eating your favorite foods.
2. **Add foods**, instead of only cutting back, to help balance your diet. For example, add whole grain products to add fiber or an additional serving of a low fat dairy product such as yogurt or cheese adds calcium.
3. **Adjust portion sizes** to help you balance nutrients in your diet. Try comparing the portion you typically eat to the serving size listed on the food label. Since the nutrition panel is based on serving size, you may actually be getting more or fewer nutrients.

LIBRARY NEWS

ILL: SATISFYING THE NEEDS FOR RESOURCES AND INFORMATION

The TSUD Library is equipped with an abundance of information through books and journals. From time to time the demand for research information goes beyond our collection.

The ILL department will be of great assistance in obtaining resources and information.

WHAT IS ILL?

ILL (interlibrary loan) is a document delivery service from library to library. The Interlibrary Loan Department provides services to faculty and students. Our focus is to make available this information as soon as possible.

The ILL Department functions as a lending and borrowing library using the OCLC Interlibrary Loan subsystem or SOLINET, which contains 33 million records of the holdings of libraries around the world. Material can also be requested on ALA forms or by telefacsimile to those libraries that do not fall under the scope of OCLC.

As a borrowing library, we submit requests for material the same day (for morning requests) and no later than the following morning for afternoon requests. Three to five days should be allowed for journal citations and five to seven days for books, dissertations, ERIC and government documents.

As a lending library, our goal is to be prompt in supplying information to public, academic, and school libraries and learning resource centers. We serve all members of the Network of Alabama Academic Libraries (NAAL), and students at our FCI and Chipola locations. We have expanded our document lending services to libraries outside the country with the latest to Valencia, Spain. We are experiencing increased requests of non-NAAL members from Texas, Illinois, Alaska, Arizona, Georgia, Nevada, Virginia, California, and more.

The TSUD Library is an institution benefiting those hoping to enhance their knowledge, whether through direct in-house resources or interlibrary loans. Visit the ILL department soon. We will provide the resources to meet the educational, research, and informational needs of faculty and students.
