

HARRISON RECEIVES AWARD

The Distinguished Alumni of the Year Award for Troy State University was presented to Dr. Thomas Harrison during the halftime activities at the recent TSU Homecoming festivities at Memorial Stadium in Troy. Dr. Jack Hawkins, Jr., chancellor of The TSU System, presented the award to Dr. Harrison.

The National Alumni Association Board of Directors selects outstanding individuals based upon a high standard of personal living, professional achievement, community service and service to the university and the Alumni Association.

While a student at Trov Univer-State Harrison sitv. served as SGA president under the administraof Dr. tion Ralph Adams, then president TSU and currently Chancellor Emeritus of The TSU System. After graduating from TSU, Harrison served in public school ministration as

assistant principal at Lanier High School in Montgomery, principal at T.R. Miller High School in Brewton, and principal of Carroll High School in Ozark.

His higher education administration began at Wallace College-Dothan, where he served as dean of student development. In 1985, he was named president of Troy State University at Dothan. Since coming to TSUD, his outstanding leadership abilities have contributed to an increase in enrollment of 65 percent, and his ability to have a vision and implement a plan of development have resulted in the construction of a beautiful campus on 250 acres of land just north of the city of Dothan. His vision continues as plans for two additional multipurpose buildings are currently on the drawing board, enabling TSUD to better serve the student population in the Wiregrass region.

He is married to the former Sarah McQueen, who is a counselor for the Ozark City Schools. They have two children: Lee Anne, a teacher in the Ozark City School System, and Gray, a senior at Troy State University.

Dr. Williams has taught counseling classes at TSUD as an adjunct instructor and has conducted a project on self-esteem and motivation at Chipola Jr. College in Marianna.

Her consultation services in the areas of group dynamics, communication dynamics, and behavioral issues have been utilized by several school systems in southeast Alabama.

She has served as vice president for the Board of Directors for the Houston County Girls Club, board member for the House of Ruth and the Southeast Alabama Youth Services, Board of Trustees member for the National Peanut Festival, president of the Kappa Pi Omega Chapter of Alpha Kappa Alpha, Inc., and vice president of the Wiregrass Museum of Art. Dr. Williams currently serves on the Family Services Center Board for the City of Dothan, Biracial Study Group, the Wiregrass Mural/Festival Council, and the Dothan-Houston County Substance Abuse Board.



PREPARE FOR NEW AREA CODE

Starting January 15, 1995, Alabama will have a new area code. 334 will be the area code for the southern half of the state. This will include Montgomery, Troy, Dothan, and Phenix City.

The northern part of the state will continue to use 205. There will be a four-month transition period for the new area code. Starting January 15, 1995, customers are encouraged to use the new 334 area code for long-distance calls to southern Alabama. However, calls using the old 205 area code will be

The long-awaited ERIC on CD-ROM is at last available at TSUD Library for you to conduct your own search. As the most comprehensive index in the field of education and psychology, ERIC contains citations and abstracts for over 800 educational journals as well as thousands of report literature. The ERIC on CD-ROM that this library subscribes to covers the literature for the last 12 years and is updated quarterly.

As an electronic index, ERIC on CD-ROM enables you to conduct keyword or Boolean searches which are not available with print index. These search features, plus the ability to print the citations, enable you to retrieve more information in a much easier and quicker way.

In addition to ERIC on CD-ROM, the mediated online DIALOG search, which covers about 400 indexes, is still available to serve you.

Good news for professors and students in the School of Business: The library has recently added <u>Fortune 500 Company Annual Reports</u> on microfiche to its collection. It is located in the fiche cabinet in the Periodical Room. We also have about 100 local and national company annual reports on paper format, and they are filed in the black file cabinet in the Reference Room.

FLOOD VICTIMS RECEIVE ADDITIONAL FINANCIAL AID FUNDS

TSUD faculty and staff are encouraged to inform students regarding the following article.

The Troy State University System has received \$232,000 in reallocated Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant (SEOG) funds and \$97,216 in reallocated College Work Study funds, which will be awarded to students within The TSU System who were affected by the floods this past summer.

Eligible applicants must have a documented financial need resulting from the adverse effects of the floods, and they must reside in the designated flood areas. Students who suffered a direct or indirect loss as result of this flooding or were unable to earn wages or conduct business in a normal fashion as a result of the flooding are encouraged to apply.

Those areas designated as federal disaster areas as of July 18, 1994, include the following counties in Alabama, Florida, and Georgia:
