

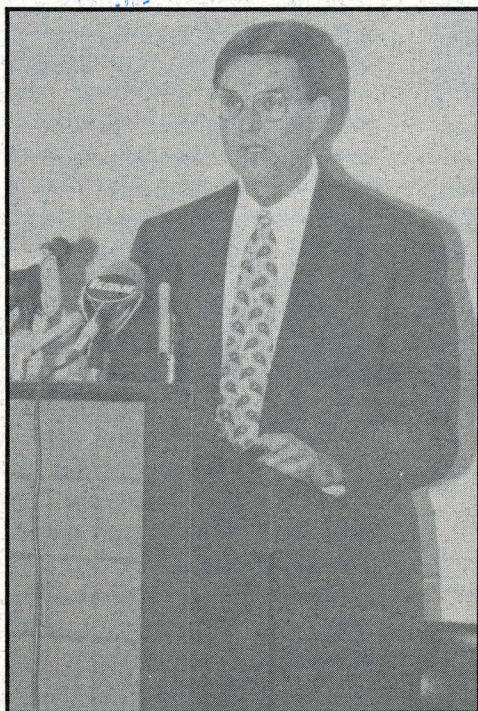

## **Dr. Harrison Announces Retirement**

Dr. Thomas Harrison, president of Troy State University at Dothan, has notified the chancellor of The Troy State University System that he plans to retire at the end of August 1995. Dr. Harrison was named TSUD president in November 1985 and took office January 1, 1986. Dr. Harrison has accepted an appointment, effective September 1, 1995, as chair and associate professor in the Department of Educational Technology, Administration, and Foundations at Columbus College in Columbus, Georgia.

During Dr. Harrison's ten years at TSUD, the university has made significant improvements in its

facilities. When Dr. Harrison assumed the presidency, TSUD was located in downtown Dothan in the renovated Houston Hall, formerly Houston Hotel, and several nearby buildings. In June 1990, TSUD relocated to its present campus on U.S. Highway 231 North with two multi-purpose buildings designed in the classic Williamsburg style of architecture and located on a 275-acre campus. The new campus has improved the image of the institution and enhanced the Dothan landscape on one of the major transportation entrances to Dothan. Dr. Harrison has overseen the development of plans for two future buildings to

provide greater space for library services and technology and for classroom and office space.

Since 1986, TSUD's enrollment has grown by 58% from 1,502 (Fall Quarter 1986) to 2,366 (Fall Quarter 1994), with an all-time high enrollment of 2,606 during Winter Quarter 1994. Much of the enrollment increase is credited to Dr. Harrison's focus on TSUD's identifying and refining its mission and his emphasis on providing appropriate programs, services, facilities, and policies to meet the needs of TSUD's predominantly non-traditional student body. TSUD has been recognized by the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching as one of the "Master's (Comprehensive) Universities and Colleges I," based on the number and level of degrees offered and awarded. Dr. Harrison has joined with the presidents of twenty-five other similar commuter institutions around the country to form an alliance of commuter institutions for the sharing of information and ideas. Inclusion in this group of institutions demonstrates the respect TSUD has earned from its collegiate peers.

Under Dr. Harrison's leadership, TSUD has made significant strides in accreditation. All of TSUD's teacher preparation programs continue to be approved by the Alabama State Board of Education. In 1989, TSUD successfully completed a comprehensive self-study and site visit by a review team for the reaffirmation of its independent accreditation from the regional ac-



crediting agency, the Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. Most recently, two units at TSUD have received national accreditation. TSUD's programs in the School of Education are accredited by the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education, and programs in the School of Business received accreditation from the Association of Collegiate Business Schools and Programs.

In addition to facilities, enrollment growth, and accreditation activities, Dr. Harrison has guided the development of TSUD's administrative structure in order to provide the best possible services and learning environment for students and to offer lifelong learning opportunities for the citizens of the Wiregrass region. While TSUD has always had extensive academic offerings at night, the university in recent years has made the schedule even more flexible by adding telecourses, more daytime offerings, classes on the weekends, and two interim sessions. TSUD's continuing education program, including training for business and industry, has been successful in providing non-credit educational opportunities for many citizens and in recruiting students for the regular academic program.

Prior to leading TSUD, Dr. Harrison served as Dean of Student Development Services at George C. Wallace State Community College in Dothan, principal of Carroll High School in Ozark, principal of T. R. Miller High School in Brewton, and assistant principal of Sidney Lanier High School in Montgomery. Dr. Harrison's administrative experiences were preceded by his being a classroom teacher in public schools in Alabama.

A graduate of Troy State University, Harrison earned the master's and doctoral degrees from Auburn University. Harrison is active in many civic and professional organizations. He is a member of the Dothan Rotary Club; Dothan Area Chamber of Commerce, where he serves on the Board of Directors;

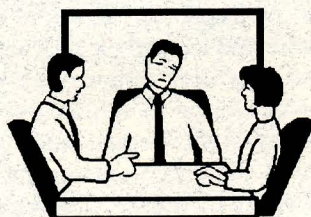
Dothan Family Services Center Committee; Dothan-Houston County Substance Abuse Board; Wiregrass Museum of Art Board of Directors.

Dr. Harrison's accomplishments in education and public service have received recognition. In the fall of 1994, Dr. Harrison was named by the TSU National Alumni Association Board as one of the distinguished alumni. Other recent honors include being recognized editorially by The Dothan Eagle for his leadership to Troy State University at Dothan and being nominated Outstanding College Administrator Award for Alabama.

When asked what he considered his most significant accomplishments at TSUD, Dr. Harrison mentioned, first and foremost, the quality of the faculty and staff he has assembled. Then he added the increased respect for TSUD from the local community and the greater higher education community, the successful efforts in accreditation, the relocation to the new campus, and the establishment of a bright future for TSUD as a Master's I commuter university.

As Dr. Harrison leaves TSUD, the university knows its mission, it recognizes and accepts the characteristics shared by the majority of the student body, and it embraces honorable principles in its decision-making process. According to Dr. Harrison, "I leave TSUD knowing that it is a purposeful, open, just, disciplined, caring, and celebrative community. I am proud of TSUD and proud of my association with it."

## TSUD Joins Area Educators



With the recent disclosure of the "Dothan by Design" project,

Wiregrass education officials from Dothan City Schools, Houston County Schools, Wallace Community College, and Troy State University at Dothan have formulated a group and a process to address the educational needs for enhancing the quality of life for area citizens.

The Education Summit Committee, as the group is called, began its venture on January 31, 1995, and since then has met on several occasions and formalized subcommittees in the areas of mission, technology, and public relations to conduct the tasks of moving education in a positive and progressive manner.

"The Education Summit Committee, as far as we know the first of its kind in Alabama, will meet regularly to plan, implement, and evaluate programs and services needed for new business development, local business expansion and retention as well as to advance quality of life concerns," stated Dr. Thomas Harrison, TSUD president.

To deal with a project of this magnitude, a group must devise a mission to show direction and to focus on a common goal. It may be a cliché, but it is also true: "If you don't know where you are going, you may not get there." The mission statement for the Education Summit Committee is: "Educators in the Wiregrass are committed to work together to produce skilled and knowledgeable citizens and to improve their quality of life."

Dr. Larry Beaty, president of Wallace College, said, "The education community in the Wiregrass, composed of the four partners here today, is committed to 'going somewhere' with education. Our mission statement





indicates where we want to go." "We believe that, with this clear sense of mission and with the support of additional community partners, we will be able to effect change and improvements in education. These changes and improvements will benefit and support the economic development and the quality of life objectives voiced by this community," Beaty added.

The Technology Subcommittee of the Education Summit Committee has immediately identified staff training as its most critical common need and has developed a plan to address that need without incurring any direct costs for the partner schools and colleges. Facilities, equipment, and personnel resources at all four partner locations are being used to train teachers and staff in computer skills ranging from basic keyboarding to multimedia applications. Classes are offered free to participants who must volunteer their time. Hundreds are already enrolled, and over 300 are on a waiting list for future classes.

"Long term, this subcommittee envisions shared access to the information highway; development of distance learning projects; consortia to apply for grant funds; coordinated planning; and joint purchasing of hardware and software. This shared



expertise also will decrease the likelihood of costly purchasing errors and increase the purchasing power of the partners,"

remarked Kenneth Lord, Houston County Schools superintendent.

Progressive school and community relations involve a mutual relationship—one where the community is interested in the schools and colleges and their work and where education institutions hold a sincere interest for the community and its citizens. If these mutual attitudes promote a personal interest and relationship and in time a mutual respect for the work of the schools and colleges and, conversely,

if the schools and colleges manifest an abiding interest in the community, then there is a progressive relationship. There can be no real relationship if the public does not know about or understand the education story of the educational institutions in the community.

"We, as a partnership, are committed to developing better methods of telling our story about public education. We are committed to creating ways to assist the Chamber of Commerce in having all the information possible in regard to programs, services, and activities that are going on in our schools and colleges so that this will offer support to the Chamber



when pursuing new business, industry, and projects for the Wiregrass region," said Dr. Don Musselman, superintendent of Dothan City Schools. "We feel that we can make a much stronger state-

ment when speaking as a unit," he added.

Each year, an industrial recruitment magazine called Area Development surveys 500 corporate executives on what is important to their companies in the site selection process, with respect to either a new site or the expansion of an existing one. Every year, education ranks in the top four quality of life issues because every good business person knows the value of a solid education.

Charles Nailen, chamber chairman, said, "If our region is to recruit top quality business and industry, then we must be able to offer top quality institutions in which to educate their employees and their children. The new spirit of cooperation being announced here today by the Education Summit Committee is an exciting partnership designed to provide just that."

"As we all know, good schools cannot be mandated or legislated. Instead, attitudes must change and a spirit of unity developed throughout the entire community. If the Dothan



area is to prosper, our educational expectations must be raised to meet the needs of the next century's employers. Through this new cooperative effort, the journey toward education excellence can begin," added Nailen.

Prior to coming to TSUD in June 1993, she was an education technician for the Federal Correctional Institution in Marianna, FL.

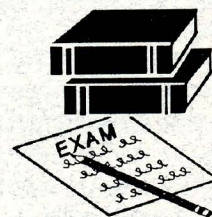
Ms. Green is a member of the Alabama Counseling Association. She also served as coach of the TSUD Women's Softball Team for their initial season.

## Library News

### Another 10th Celebration

The TSUD Library reached a milestone in June 1995; the 10,000th library card was issued. It's coincidental that the 10,000th card was issued during our 10th Anniversary Celebration of SACS accreditation.

The Library began issuing borrowers' cards in 1985 in order to use, what then, was a somewhat progressive mechanical system, the Gaylord Charge system. Prior to that, the Library used the old "sign your name" system. Of course, things have changed dramatically since 1985.

Consider what the 10,000th card means: that many students have attended TSUD over that period, that many students have made use of the Library at least once over that period, that many clerical entries have been made in the borrowers' register, that many registration cards have been typed and filed, and at least that many questions have been asked of TSUD staff.

We hope that well before the 20,000th library card is issued that the TSUD Library will be part of an on-line circulation system, which will use bar codes, wands, file servers, etc., all of which are part of today's sophisticated library technology. Different library systems will be networked so that TSUD students can search simultaneously all the holdings records of colleges and universities in Alabama. Their search will tell them if the book is owned, on order, on the shelf, or checked out and when due back in. The student can process his/her own request for a title on-line or can have full text transmitted via high speed transmission. Our successors will look back and wonder how we managed with what, to them, would be a primitive system.

She began teaching at TSUD in January, 1985, and is also an English teacher in the Enterprise City School System.

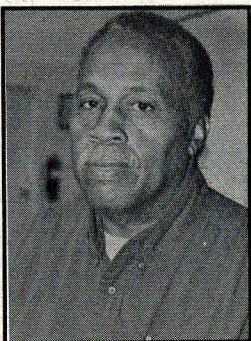
Her publications include articles in the Alabama School Journal and the Birmingham News.

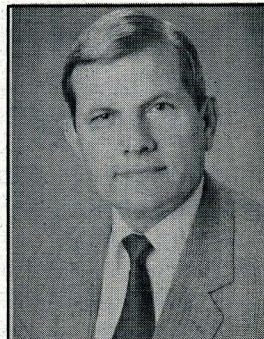
#### TSUM Names Interim VP

Retired USAF Brigadier General Robin G. Tornow has been promoted to interim vice president of Administration and Finance at Troy State University Montgomery. Since 1993, Tornow has been the director of campus planning and development at TSUM.



Mr. Tornow brings to TSUM a vast background of leadership ability. Previous activities include being one of four senior Air Force Pentagon Planners responsible for developing a coordinated joint and national security policy, chairman of a \$5 billion annual budgeted weapons program committee, introducing the F-15E fighter aircraft into active inventory, and developing all maintenance and flying training programs for that aircraft. From 1990 to 1993, he served as the Commander (Chief Executive Officer) of the Air Force Reserve Officer Training program with a \$50 million budget.

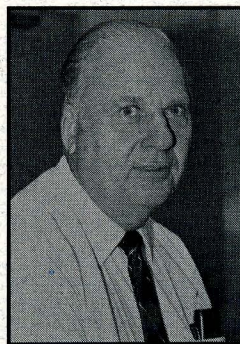

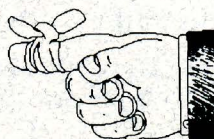
