BELSCHES NAMED ARTS & SCIENCE DEAN

Dr. Alan Belsches, professor of English at Troy State University Dothan, has been named dean of the College of Arts and Sciences. Belsches received his bachelor's degree from the

College of William and Mary and his master's degree from the University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill. In 1983, he received his Ph.D. in English from the University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill.

Some of his publications include: Introduction to Devil Make a Third by Dothan author Douglas Fields Bailey; "A Treasury Most Dear: The Use of

Memory in Eudora Welty's Early Short Stories" in Notes On Mississippi Writers; Review of Look Homeward: A Life of Thomas Wolfe in the Alabama Literary Review; and "Life Over Death: The Role of Memory" in Walker Percy's The Second Coming in The Southern Quarterly. He has presented numerous papers and lectures in several locations, locally and nationally, on various literary topics.

"I do know that we will continue to listen to our students and continue to provide to them the services they need in order to make their stay here pleasant," added Alford.

TSUD Loses Two of Its Own

Two TSUD faculty members passed away during the summer, leaving the university in a state of sorrow.

Dr. John Woodham, professor emeritus of history, passed away on July 30, 1997, after a long battle with cancer. Dr. Woodham was the director of the Dr. Woodham international relations program, a

graduate program in the College of Arts and Sciences. Dr. Woodham was employed with TSUD in March of 1971. His wife, Sonja, works in library services, and we are glad that she is back with us for the fall quarter.

Longtime friend and former dean Larry Brown said, "Dr. Woodham was an excellent teacher and scholar whose presence is still evident in the many

classrooms occupied by his former students."

The School of Education lost one of its outstanding faculty members. Dr. Robert Jones, on August 16, 1997, due to complications following knee replacement surgery. Dr. Jones was an associate professor of psychology and

counseling and had been with TSUD since September of 1993. His specialty area was in substance abuse and prevention. At the time of his death, he was serving as the chairman of the board for the Dothan/Houston County Substance Abuse Partnership.

Both of these gentlemen will be greatly missed here at TSUD.

TSUD Semester Conversion Process Begins

Beginning with the Fall 1999 term, Troy State University Dothan will convert from a quarter to semester system. Instead of four ten-week quarters in the school year, there will be three semesters. The fall and spring semesters will be about 15 weeks long each not including the final exam periods. Fall semester will run from mid-August to early December with spring semester beginning in early January and ending in early May. The summer term will be approximately ten weeks long.

The conversion to semesters by The Troy State University System is in response to several factors. Beginning in Fall 1998, most other two- and four-year colleges and universities in the state of Alabama will convert from quarters to semesters. More than two-thirds of the colleges and universities in the U.S. are now on the semester course schedule. The conversion is also in response to an articulation and general studies recommendation made by the Alabama Commission on Higher Education to convert to semesters within two years.

Converting to semesters offers several advantages to students. Since the majority of state-assisted institutions in Alabama will convert to semesters, the impact on students transferring within the University System of Alabama will be slight. Students will be able to transfer courses from one school to another without losing credits. It will also be easier for stu-

dents to cross-register with schools on the semester system. Students will also have more time to spend understanding and retaining material covered in their courses. Students won't have the intense pressure of completing course work in the shorter time frame of a quarter.

The University has formed four committees to plan and organize the conversion process. The Semester Conversion Committee will develop the semester academic calendar and coordinate planning among the other committees. The Academic Committee will revise curriculum, define degree requirements, and develop a master schedule into the first semester year. The Student Concerns Committee will plan advisement and training, develop financial aid and admissions deadlines, inform the public, and plan and implement all technology changes. The Business and Finance Committee will develop payment plans and assist other areas in determining other costs associated with semester conversion.

TSUD President Michael Malone says "As we move to the semester system, the first guiding principle will be: No student will be ill served by the transition process."

The transition is on!

and mailed to the student within ten business days. If there is a debit in the student's account, the student is required to pay the difference. The student may receive notice from the financial aid source that the financial aid has been electronically transmitted to the University, but the Financial Aid Office cannot post that aid to the student's aid file until the guarantee is received.

In short, student aid applications must be completed accurately and submitted in a timely manner and financial aid must be guaranteed before it can be posted to the student's account.

His influence will be in my counseling forever.

Library News

As a means of cutting costs, the Library has cancelled more than 100 journal titles. The cost of journals increases an average of 10% each year, and this year was no exception. On the plus side, over 95% of the journals cancelled are available in full-text through one of the three databases to which the Library subscribes. This means that students and faculty will still have access to the journals, in electronic format, and can make print copies of articles.

TSUD is not alone in cutting journal subscriptions. Libraries across the state have made the same difficult decision. Among Alabama's university libraries, there is concern that at some point no library will have a subscription to particular titles, and that full test journals available now may not be available two to three years from now. The commercial vendor may not offer the same titles from year to year. Document delivery may become more prevalent (at a higher cost) as libraries continue to wrestle with means of delivering journals to its constituencies. In some cases, libraries are resorting to an industrial trend in providing "just in time" services.

Summer quarter was our first experience with "full-text" delivery. The vast majority of the students were pleased with the service. An added benefit of online databases is that students can e-mail the journal article directly to their home computer. All of us are finding that we must adjust to new methods of delivery of services. These new methods are here to stay.




