JOHN WOODHAM MEMORIAL LECTURE SERIES CONTINUES AT TSUD


Troy State University Dothan recently held the third lecture in a series of lectures to honor the memory of late TSUD professor of history, Dr. John Woodham. The lecture was hosted by Dr. Priscilla McArthur, TSUD professor of history, and was entitled *Russia 1992 and 1998 - A Report*. The lecture compared her visit to the heartland of central Russia in 1992 to her 1998 trip across the western cities and countryside.

"The most obvious contrasts between the visits," McArthur revealed, "were how westernized the big cities like St. Petersburg and Moscow have become and how improved the attitudes of the people came across on their hopeful faces. The grim picture of Russian life that we are exposed to in the west did not appear as harsh as an American visitor might expect. Problems like lack of money and food shortages were present, but extremely long lines were rare where my tour group visited, and the outlook of the people was one of resilient determination."

Dr. Belsches, TSUD dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, said that the John Woodham Memorial Lecture Series came about because the faculty in Arts and Sciences wanted to do something to honor the memory of such a diverse and talented educator. "We envision the series to run one lecture per quarter for the next few years," Belsches said. "The lecture times will vary each quarter, and the variety of topics covered will range from national to more local themes. As future lecture topics are confirmed, we will do our best to make the information available for anyone interested."



ALABAMA VIRTUAL LIBRARY

The Network of Alabama Academic Libraries (NAAL), of which TSUD is a member, is a strong proponent for funding a proposed Alabama Virtual Library (AVL). Three million dollars is being requested by the Steering Committee of AVL from new growth revenue in the FY2000 Special Education Trust Fund to fund this project. The majority of these funds would be for licensing databases. Other expenses would be for training and for setup and management of the infrastructure, including purchasing the server, Gateway software, and technical support. The concept is similar to that of the much-heralded GALILEO project in Georgia. The goal is to provide all students, teachers, and citizens of the state with online access to essential library and information resources through shared licensing arrangements.

The content of the AVL will be delivered over the Internet through existing computers in public schools, community colleges, four-year colleges, and public libraries across the state. This will provide equitable information to all citizens of Alabama, from rural areas to the urban areas. There will be no charge to anyone for access to the AVL.

Not only will our faculty and students be able to utilize these resources in the short-term, but K-12 students will be better equipped to enter TSUD and be successful college students in the long-term. The Alabama Virtual Library will be a tremendous asset to the education of all Alabama citizens.

Ms. Rachel Hodges has been named the periodicals coordinator in the TSUD Library. Rachel is a graduate of the University of Montevallo with a Bachelor of Arts degree in English Literature. Her interests include art and writing, and she has written articles for *The Dothan Eagle*. Please come by the periodicals department of the Library and welcome Rachel to the TSUD family.

TSU COLLEGE OF BUSINESS SHIFTING GEARS TO PRACTICAL APPROACH

The Sorrell College of Business at Troy State University is changing its focus to better prepare graduates for the world of work, according to Dean Tom Ratcliffe. Dr. Ratcliffe, who has served as dean since October 1997, believes the altered focus will create a stronger partnership between the university and the business community. While he doesn't advocate taking a wrecking ball to the ivory tower of academia, he does believe in a practical approach. "In our mission statement, it says we need to educate the business leaders of the future and to educate the business leaders of today to meet the challenges of the future," Dr. Ratcliffe said. "We have to have an approach that combines the best of the academic world and the best of the business world. We have to bridge that gap to be successful."

Several new programs instituted over the past year are designed with that core vision in mind, including an executive MBA program, a rejuvenated business advisory council, and a faculty that is in tune with current business trends and practices. The executive MBA program with HealthSouth Inc. is the best example of the university-business partnership philosophy, Dr. Ratcliffe said. The Sorrell College of Business worked with the health-care corporation to devise a master's in business administration that will ultimately be completed by hundreds of the company's employees across the nation. The first classes in the program, taught mostly via the Internet, began in August; some 60 HealthSouth employees have enrolled. "By tailoring a program to fit HealthSouth's needs, we are able to help HealthSouth grow the company's next generation of leaders," Dr. Ratcliffe said. "They will all receive their training from Troy State, so they will have the same direction, the same vision, as opposed to having 100 different employees attend 100 different schools. The program is not only health-care specific, it's HealthSouth specific." Dr. Ratcliffe said the executive MBA program is vital to the futures of both TSU and HealthSouth. "Most of the employees in this program are occupational therapists, physical therapists or even some medical doctors, who are very good in their fields, but they don't have a basic understanding of business," Dr. Ratcliffe said. "It's also great for Troy State University, as we have doubled the numbers in our MBA program." In that same vein, the College of Business has tailored a program for employees of Lockheed-Martin in Troy, although that program provides undergraduate courses. "These programs also give our faculty members a chance to keep abreast of business trends, which gives us great ideas for research," Dr. Ratcliffe said.

The recently revived Business Advisory Council also helps the business college faculty and administration know what needs to be taught to prepare TSU students to step in and contribute immediately when they are hired after graduation. "Most colleges of business have advisory councils, but we actually listen to our council and make changes in our programs based upon their suggestions," Dr. Ratcliffe said. "For example, one of the members of our accounting advisory council suggested we have our students fill out some of the tax forms by hand instead of doing them all on the computer because that's the way they'll have to understand them in the working world." The council has also come up with the idea of tailoring an executive MBA program to meet the needs of smaller businesses. "They (the council) said they loved the HealthSouth program but they wanted a program that would meet their needs, so we're going to do it," the dean said.

Dr. Ratcliffe is so wedded to the practical approach that he provides release time for faculty to work in a professional environment. This helps them become better teachers when they return to the classroom. "We'll have accounting professors preparing returns during tax season, for example," he said. "We also encourage international participation, because we want our faculty to be more global in scope. We have one faculty member working on a project in Hong Kong right now." When it comes to obtaining practical experience outside the classroom, Dr. Ratcliffe leads by example. The dean is the only CPA in the United States whose primary responsibilities are in academia who performs peer review of CPA firms, a task generally relegated to practicing CPAs.

TSUM CELEBRATES RENOVATION OF NEW FACILITIES

Troy State University Montgomery cut the ribbon opening a new student/community center on Tuesday, December 15. The center is located on the first floor of Whitley Hall, formerly the Whitley Hotel. The Whitley Hotel was completed in 1923 and was one of Alabama's prominent hotels. Troy State bought the building in the 1970s and started renovating it into a campus dedicated to higher education. "We'd like to establish once and for all that the hotel is no more," said TSUM President Glenda Curry. Dr. Curry said the renovations are as much for the people of Montgomery as the students.


The first floor was the last to be renovated in the old Whitley Hotel which started a year ago to convert into a new student center. The renovations include a new self-serve bookstore, restaurant, coffee shop, information center, T.V. lounges, civic room, and three meeting rooms. The student center meeting rooms have been installed with state of the art audio and video equipment which can accommodate audio and video teleconferencing, as well as satellite downlink conferencing. Civic and business meetings can be conducted at TSUM with catering done by TSUM's food service contractor Marriott.

Future plans at TSUM call for the renovation of the exterior of Whitley Hall, completion of the campus plaza, and construction of The Rosa Parks Library and Museum.




Quest for Excellence TSUD Library/Technology Building

TSUD is in the midst of planning for an exciting celebration which will mark the beginning of construction of the Library/Technology Building. The 52,000 square foot, two-story building will complete the core of the emerging TSUD campus and will be a hallmark of southeast Alabama's rightful place in the future of Alabama. The state-of-the-art building will include a library with online access to state, national and international databases and library catalogs, six networked computer laboratories, a 250-seat lecture hall, three classrooms for traditional and distance education delivery, areas for student and faculty project development, a studio for original TSUD productions, and a space for community/corporate conferences and training. The traditional and stately Williamsburg architecture will complement the high-tech functions that will serve the educational, cultural, and training needs of the Wiregrass community for years to come.
