DR. JONES SERVING AS CHANCELLOR'S FELLOW

Dr. Sandra Lee Jones, TSUD assistant professor of education, has been selected to represent TSUD in the 1999-2000 Chancellor's Fellow class. As part of her fellowship, Dr. Jones will be shadowing Dr. Cameron Martindale, interim president of TSUM. Dr. Jones shared her experiences thus far in a recent conversation.

Q: As a requirement of the Fellow's program, what project will you be working on to present at the end of your term?

Dr. Jones: Dr. June Link, chancellor's fellow from TSU, and I will be creating a brochure on accreditation for faculty use. As faculty, we are given lots of information and we want to take all of this information and develop a brochure that is "user-friendly" and that will describe the importance of faculty's role in accreditation. This will be a brochure for the entire system. I will also be working on a project specifically for TSUM in the area of student affairs.

Q: What is the one thing that you have learned thus far that you would like to share?

Dr. Jones: I have learned that we (TSUD) are much more autonomous than I once believed. I have also learned a great deal about what being part of a "system" means, and I have a better appreciation for the administrative processes that we share. It is easy to get caught up in our own goals and needs, but we are part of a dynamic system.

Q: Have you found any similarities between TSUD and TSUM?

Dr. Jones: They are facing a space problem like us and they are also preparing for semester conversion. They also have strong ties with the military, like our relationship with Fort Rucker.

Q: What differences have you seen?

Dr. Jones: They offer no daytime classes. They are completely an evening university.

Q: Is their program delivery similar to ours?

Dr. Jones: In some areas, yes, but they are also very much into modifying their delivery and to developing alternate delivery methods. They have approximately 3,400 students and about 20% of their students are taught through distance learning.

Q: What would you say to someone who was considering participating in the program?

Dr. Jones: No one should go into this and not expect to be changed. I have learned so much and have met such wonderful people. You must be willing to give it everything you've got. It is truly an unbelievable experience.

Q: What has been the most difficult part?

Dr. Jones: The transition between being a Fellow and full-time faculty. I find myself in a "time warp" because in a sense I am a student when I am at TSUM, and then I have to shift back into being the teacher when I return to TSUD.

Q: Has this experience influenced your professional goals?

Dr. Jones: I have always had a desire to be in adult education and to be a part of the administration. Being a chancellor's fellow has reinforced this. Dr. Martindale has basically said "follow me," and she has allowed me to be a part of everything that she does. She will also spend time with me asking me how I would have handled a particular situation. No one could have told me how much I was going to learn through this process.
