RECOGNITION CEREMONY HELD FOR **OUTSTANDING FACULTY AND STAFF**

TSUD held a recognition ceremony honoring outstanding faculty and staff on Thursday, September 28, 2000, in the Malone Hall Harrison Room. According to Dr. Barbara Alford, executive vice president, the outstanding faculty and staff awards have previously been announced at TSUD's annual Honor's Convocation but a special ceremony was held this year to highlight the "best of the best at TSUD." Those receiving awards at the ceremony were:

Dr. Robert Saunders - Outstanding Faculty Member, College of Arts and Sciences. Dr. Saunders joined TSUD in 1997 and serves as assistant professor of history. He received his bachelor of arts from Auburn University, master's degree from Salisbury State, and his Ph.D. from Auburn University.

Dr. Parviz Parsa - Outstanding Faculty Member, School of Business. As professor of business, Dr. Parsa is a veteran at TSUD, having joined the faculty ranks in 1982. He received his bachelor of science from Tehran, his master's from Texas Christian, and his Ph.D. from Oklahoma.

Dr. Kirk Davis - Outstanding Faculty Member, School of Education. Dr. Davis, assistant professor of psychology, came to TSUD in 1998 from the University of Mississippi. He earned his bachelor's and master's degrees from Mississippi State University and a second master's and Ph.D. from the University of Mississippi.

Mrs. Joanne Krist - Outstanding Classified Staff Member, Student and Community Services. Mrs. Krist serves as clerk typist III in the Office of Counseling and Career Services. She joined TSUD in 1993 and holds a Microcomputer Certificate from TSUD Continuing Education.

Mrs. Farrow Burks - Outstanding Professional Staff Member, Student and Community Services. TSUD in 1996 as coordinator for personal development, Mrs. Burks currently serves as coordinator for public relations and student activities. She earned her bachelor's degree in marketing from Auburn University and an MBA from TSUD.

FIRE PREVENTION IN THE HOME

Residential fires kill an average of 5,000 people, injure an additional 21,000 persons, and cost \$3.4 billion dollars each year! Here are some safety tips for you:

SMOKE DETECTORS

Smoke is responsible for three out of four deaths.

- •Install smoke detectors on every level of your home and outside of sleeping areas.
- •Test every detector at least once a month. [See your instruction book for the location of the test button.]
- •Keep smoke detectors dust free. Replace batteries with new ones at least once a year or sooner if the detector makes a chirping sound.
- •If you have a smoke detector directly wired into your electrical system, be sure that the little signal light is blinking periodically. This tells you that the alarm is active.
- •Inexpensive smoke detectors are available for the hearing impaired.

FIRE EXTINGUISHERS

They remain your best bet if you're on the spot when a fire begins.

- •Fire extinguishers should be mounted in the kitchen, garage, and workshop.
- •Purchase an ABC type extinguisher for extinguishing all types of fires.
- •Learn how to use your fire extinguisher before there is an emergency.
- •Remember, use an extinguisher on small fires only. If there is a large fire, get out immediately and call 911 from another location.

CLOTHES DRYER

Under some circumstances, dangerous heat can build up in a dryer.

- •Never leave home with the clothes dryer running.
- •Dryers must be vented to the outside, not into a wall or attic.
- •Clean the lint screen frequently to keep the airway clear.
- •Never put in synthetic fabrics, plastic, rubber, or foam because they retain heat.

KITCHEN

Careless cooking is the number one cause of residential fires.

- Never leave cooking unattended.
- •It's wise to have a fire extinguisher near the kitchen. Keep it 10 feet away from the stove on the exit side of the kitchen.
- •Never pour water on a grease fire; turn off the stove and cover the pan with a lid or close the oven door.
- •Keep pot handles on the stove pointing to the back and always watch young children in the kitchen.
- •Don't store items on the stove top, as they could catch fire.
- •Clean the exhaust hood and duct over the stove regularly and wipe up spilled grease as soon as the surface of the stove is cool.

STATE POLICE CHIEF'S ASSOCIATION SELECTS UNIVERSITY PARTNERSHIP

The University Partnership of Alabama Continuing Education has been selected to provide management-level training for police chiefs in the state. At the State Conference held at the Florence Conference Center in August, the partnership hosted the first session entitled, "Update on Harassment, Discrimination, and Disability Issues."

The purpose of this program is to provide high quality, executive-level training leading to professional certification for police chiefs of Alabama and to help police chiefs reach their highest possible level of professional achievement.

Certification is earned when a police chief completes ten courses and masters each course exam with a minimum score of 70 percent.

The Troy State University Dothan Alumni Association held its Fourth Annual Alumni Association meeting in the Harrison Room on the TSUD Campus Thursday, August 17, 2000. Gordon Stone, executive director of the state's Higher Education Partnership (HEP), served as the keynote speaker during the two hour meeting. Stone provided insight to the more than 40 alumni members in attendance about the past and present role the HEP has played in insuring that Alabama's 15, four-year universities are equally represented each time the State Legislature is in session. 
